

### 336 Applications For Mattresses in County

#### Government Provides Material, Farm Families Labor in This Federal Project

Only 336 applications for mattresses Program have been received in Moore county to date, and Miss Flora McDonald, home agent, states that she feels that at least 500 mattresses should be made here when farm families of Anson county are making 2,000.

The work is being carried on in the old Tyson garage in Carthage under the supervision of Mrs. W. E. Kelly of the Springfield Home Demonstration Club, assisted by the home agent and the farm security home supervisor. Anyone who wishes to learn to make mattresses is welcome to observe and assist in the work.

The purpose of the program is three-fold: To provide materials for making mattresses to low-income families; to expand the use of cotton; to provide demonstrations through which rural people learn how to make mattresses at small cost. The program is sponsored jointly by three agencies of the Department of Agriculture in connection with State agencies.

Farm families having a normal cash income of less than \$400 are eligible to receive materials for making a mattress. The application calls for 50 pounds of cotton and ten yards of ticking, the materials required for one mattress, and the applicant makes no cash outlay except the small cost of needles and thread. However, members of the family must provide the labor. The plan is a cooperative one, through which the various families help each other with the construction of the mattresses.

All applications must be filed in the office of the county farm or home agent, where they are reviewed. They are then turned over to the county AAA committee for final review as to eligibility of the applicant, and for placing the order for materials.

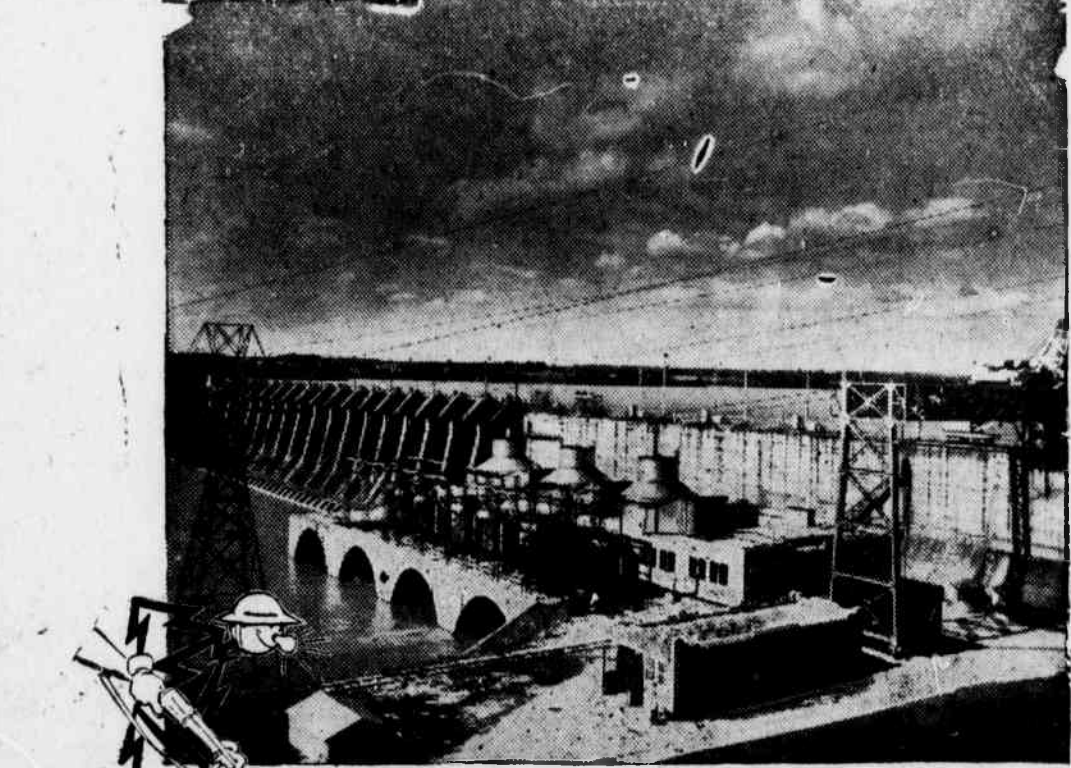

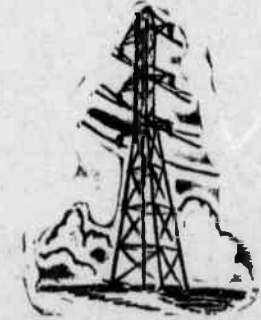
