Marine Corps Proving Popular With Tarheels

More Than 1,000 Have Enlisted in Less Than Year.—Pay Boosted To \$30 a Month

The United States Marine Corps has been authorized an increase in pay as well as an increase in personnel effective October 1st. The increase in pay brings the pay of the Marine Corps up to that of the Navy and affects different rating from \$6.00 to \$12.00 per month. The pay of a private automatically jumps from \$21.00 to \$30.00 per month after completion of four months service and all other grades up the line in accordance. An increase of 4,600 men, brings the authorized total strength of the Marines to 38,600, which will be distributed among units of the Fleet Marine Force, the Marine Air Force, to the Fleet and Navy Yard detachment and to detachments for the new Atlantic and Caribbean bases leased from England.

In less than one year's time over 1,000 Tar Heels have enlisted in the Marine Corps through the U. S. Marine Corps Recruiting stations located in the Postoffice buildings at Raleigh, Wilmington and Winston-Salem. In computing the number of men to be drafted from North Carolina, this state will be credited with the number of men who have voluntarily enlisted. For this reason it is figured that this state will have the least number of men per capita to be drafted.

Applicants for enlistment must be white, single, 18 to 30 years of age, 64 to 74 inches in height, be of good moral character, in excellent physical condition, without any dependents and have the equivalent of an eighth grade education or better. Men over 25 years of age must possess some special qualification.
