Doc Garner Dies in Hospital After Brutal Attack During Joy-Ride

Irwin Lambert Held Without Bail After Alleged Assault With Scantling

An evening of joy-riding participated in by three married men and their girl companions had a tragic ending in the fatal injury of Doc Garner of High Falls, driver of the car, who, according to the testimony given in a hearing Saturday afternoon before Justice Hugh P. Kelly, in Carthage, was struck with a scantling by Irwin Lambert of near Hemp about 2:00 o'clock Wednesday morning and died Thursday morning in the Moore County Hospital without regaining consciousness. Lambert is being held without privilege of bail.

The fight in which Garner was fatally injured is said to have occurred after Lambert had remarked that he was the "sucker," that he had furnished the gas and oil and that the other boys had a girl and he didn't following up his remarks by striking Garner.

The story, as revealed by evidence in court, is as follows:

Doc Garner, his cousin, Tom Garner of near Hemp, and Irwin Lambert who resides about half way between Hemp and Hemp Cross Roads, started out about dark Tuesday evening, going to Putnam, where they picked up Mozelle Beal. After this, they went near Cameron to get Margaret Medlin, but found that she had left a note telling them that she would be at Green Gables. Going there and failing to find her, the four proceeded to a filling station beyond Sanford, then returned to Green Gables, where they found the Garner girl. She told them that she could not go with them until after she had carried her sister to Vass, so the first group went to Carolina Pines, near Cameron, where they found Lizzie Martin of Hemp and a younger sister, who were stranded and asked for a ride home. They picked the Martin girls up, continued to Vass where they were joined by the Medlin girl, and started to Hemp.

Doc Garner, the owner of the car, was driving and seated on the front seat with him were Mozelle Beal and the two Martin girls. Tom Garner, the Medlin girl and Irwin Beal were on the rear seat.

Irwin kept trying to get Lizzie Martin to ride with him on the rear seat, which she refused to do. He finally tried to force Doc Garner to make her get on the back seat, and Garner refused.

When the party reached the premises of Lambert's father-in-law, between Hemp and Hemp Cross Roads, Lambert asked Doc to stop the car and let him out, which he did. Getting out of the car onto the road, Lambert made the complaint about being a "sucker," and struck Doc Garner on the head with a piece of iron, knocking him against the Beal girl. The Martins and Medlin jumped from the car and ran. Tom and Doc got out and a free-for-all ensued.

Lambert finally freed himself and grabbed a scantling with which he struck the fatal blow. Tom fled and Lambert, after remarking that he guessed he had killed Doc, left the scene.

Mozelle Beal then loaded the unconscious man into the car and drove to the Kennedy Funeral Home in Hemp, where he was transferred to an ambulance. Upon arriving at the funeral home, she found Lambert there. Both men went to the hospital in the same vehicle. Lambert received first aid and was dismissed.

Lambert was arrested Wednesday morning; Tom Garner was taken Thursday and the girls were committed to jail Friday when it was feared that they might skip. They were held until after the hearing Saturday, when all except Lambert were released.

The Weather

Twenty-One All Clear Days in September, With Nine Days 90 or Above

A few days of hot and extremely dry weather approaching the close of summer, with the highest temperature of the month, 98 degrees, occurring on the 23rd, the first day of Autumn, forecast an abnormally torrid month of September, but the sudden drop in temperature beginning on the 26th brought the average temperature for the month 2.2 degrees lower than normal for the month.

Twenty-one days of the month were all clear, seven days partly cloudy and two days cloudy. Four days with passing showers gave only 1.06 inches of rain, 2.52 inches less than normal for the month. Four days gave so small a trace as to be unmeasurable. Deficiency in rainfall for the year is now 13.39 inches.

Nine days of the month recorded temperatures from 90 to 95 degrees. Lowest temperature, 44 degrees, was recorded on the 26th.

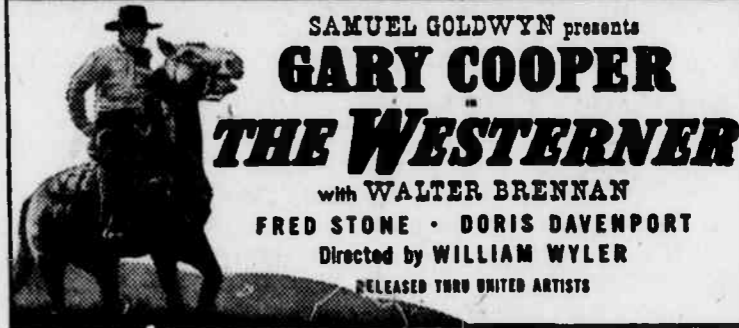
