Must Stay "On Wagon" or Serve Six Months

Charlie Freeman of Carthage Found Guilty of Assaulting Wife—Other Court Cases

For striking his wife with his fist and being drunk and disorderly, Charlie Freeman, white, of Carthage, was in Recorder's Court Monday given six months on the roads, to be suspended upon condition that he pay the costs and not take another drink of any kind of intoxicating beverage.

Clyde Lineberry and Arnie Carlisle, white, of Carthage, were charged with assaulting Luther Cagle with a deadly weapon and with secret assault. Lineberry was found guilty of assault and battery and given 60 days on the roads, to be suspended upon payment of a fine of \$25 and the costs, and on the secret assault count was bound to Superior court under bond of \$300. Carlisle was found guilty of using vile, indecent language and sentenced to serve 30 days on the roads, this to be suspended upon payment of a fine of \$25 and the costs.

Robert Seymour, white, of Sanford, found guilty of public drunkenness and using vile language, paid a \$15 fine and the costs and his 60-day road sentence was suspended.

Major Marshall, of Southern Pines, also chose the pay-out route in a careless and reckless driving case, and his 60-day sentence was suspended. Marshall's license to drive was revoked for twelve months.
