Then, three weeks ago, he got a letter from the War Department. His draft number had been called and yesterday he came over to say goodbye.

"How do you feel about it?" I asked him, watching to see if there was any sign of disappointment on his face.

"Fine," he said, "Just fine."

"But your job," I went on.

"It will be here when I get back. And maybe I was getting into a rut. Maybe need to be away from it a while. Besides it's only for a year. And a year . . ."

He looked out across our yard with its early Spring green to the vacant lot next door where he'd played ball when he was a kid and still did sometimes when he got home early enough.

"A year isn't much to give to a country that gives a fellow as much as this one does. My folks never had much money, as you know. But I got a good education. Then, when I wanted a job at the garage instead of running the dairy as Dad does, Mr. Hughes gave me a chance. I guess I've made god. I've helped in the office the last six months besides working on cars. I've been able to do things for the folks and save some money besides and I've had a lot of fun . . ."

"I want other boys to have the same kind of opportunities I've had . . . oh, like a chance to play ball when they're kids, to go to school as long as they want to and to work at things they like and to save money. If my going into the army is going to help keep those opportunities, I'm willing. Besides," he added, grinning, "I want to own that garage some day and the only way I can be sure of it is to help keep this country the kind where men are free to own businesses and to go ahead as far as their abilities will take them."

So, it looks as if we'd be setting our clocks by Jimmy again some day . . . for hard work and ambition of that kind or bound to succeed in a country whose industrial system welcomes the man of ability.

Two Arrested Here For Series of Chicken Thefts

Niagara and Hemp Men in Moore County Jail After Being Shadowed

Lewis Seward, white, of Niagara, and Roy Crenshaw, white, formerly of Scotland county but temporarily a resident of Hemp, were placed in the Moore county jail Saturday charged with breaking and entering and larceny, and officers feel that their arrest is the first step in solving a wholesale theft of chickens and meat.

According to a Moore county deputy, chicken thieves have been working in Scotland, Hoke, Moore and Montgomery counties for the past six to eight weeks and up to the arrest of the two suspects, no officer in any one of the counties had been able to apprehend anyone. The officers felt that there was an organized hand, but did not know where it was operating from.

Seward, who was arrested in Pinehurst, and Crenshaw, who was taken in Hemp, had been shadowed for a week before their arrest, the officer said. There is one indictment from Hoke county, and will be more than one from Moore, he disclosed, but declined to give out any particulars, saying that the investigation is still under way.

WOMEN'S FIELD ARMY DECLARES CANCER WAR

"Fight Cancer With Knowledge" is the challenging appeal of the Women's Field Army of the American Society for the Control of Cancer. Mrs. Ernest Poate of Southern Pines leads the local unit of the Field Army, and contributions to aid the cause may be sent to her.

The knowledge that persons should have, according to the American Society for the Control of Cancer, emphasizes two points:

1. The great importance of having complete physical examinations once a year, however well one may feel. Women over 35 should have an examination of the two sites where the disease so often occurs — the breast and womb—twice a year.

2. Men and women should know the symptoms that may mean cancer is present. They are usually painless. If any of the following cancer danger signals or symptoms appear, go to a competent physician at once: any persistent lump or thickening, particularly in the breast; any irregular bleeding or discharge from any body opening; any persistent and unexplained indigestion; any sore that does not heal normally, especially about the tongue, mouth or lips; any sudden change in the form or rate of growth of a mole or wart.

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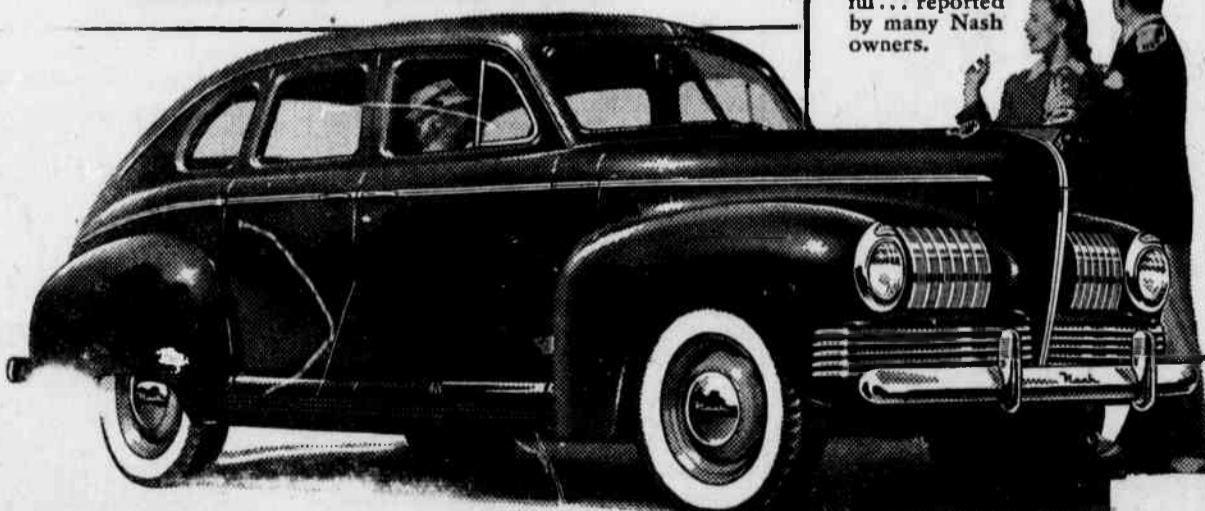
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
