

Two Nabbed for Driving After Losing Licenses

Six Cases of Recklessness on Highways Heard in Recorder's Court

A miss is as good as a mile, it is said, but two Moore county men who were driving after their licenses had been revoked failed to "miss" and the rides proved quite expensive. One was traveling only about one-half mile on the highway, but an officer came along at the very moment to pick him up.

Woodrow Boles, white, of Carthage, charged with drunken driving and driving after his license had been revoked, was given four months on the roads, to be suspended upon payment of a fine of \$100 and the costs, there being evidence that it was a third offense, and his license was revoked for three years.

James Robinson, colored, of Pinehurst, pleaded guilty to driving after the revocation of his license, and he was given 60 days on the roads, to be suspended upon payment of the costs of this action and upon payment of the entire amount of the fine and the costs in a case tried last week and upon the further condition that he not operate a motor vehicle on the highways until his license is restored to him.

L. M. Cooper, white, of Sanford, paid a \$25 fine and the costs for careless, reckless and drunken driving, was fined \$50 and the costs and his license was revoked for a year.

The steel industry plans to spend more than \$282,000,000 during the present year for plant expansion and improvement, which will be of valuable aid to the nation's program of defense.

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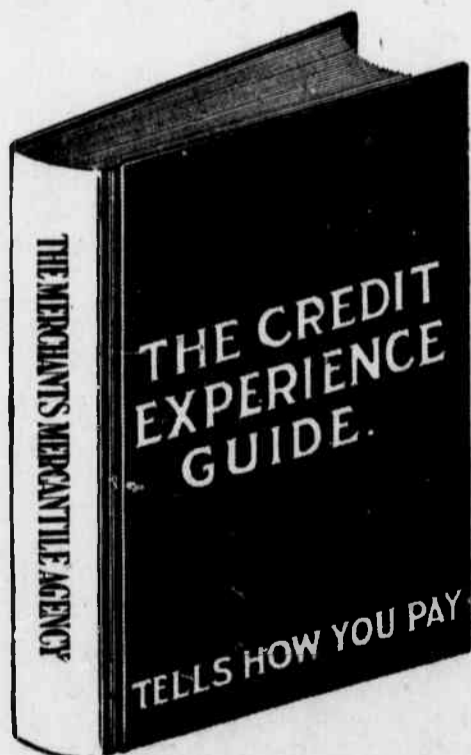
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
