

## COURT DISPOSES NUMBER OF CASES

### Large Docket Cleared in All-Day Session; Drunken Drivers Are Fined

Recorder's Court in Carthage Monday was an all-day affair, with more than a score of cases of various kinds coming up for trial.

Three northern girls, Minnie Campiglia, 21, and Ann Campiglia, 19, both of Brooklyn, N. Y., and Mary Farrara, 19, of Leominster, Mass., who had been in jail for several days following their arrest in Aberdeen on charges of prostitution and vagrancy, were found not guilty, there being no evidence against them as to immorality. They testified that they were looking for work, and that they were acquainted with some soldiers with whom they had been seen.

Oscar Holloway, a soldier, found guilty of unlawful possession of liquor, transporting, and drunken driving, was given a 60-day road sentence, suspended upon payment of \$50 fine and costs. His license was revoked for a year.

Three soldiers who were riding with Holloway, Ollea A. Wolf, George E. Ginn and C. D. Black, were charged with possessing and transporting illegal whiskey and being drunk and disorderly. Their 30-day sentences were to be suspended provided they pay the costs, but they were still in jail Tuesday.

Ethel M. Smith, alias Ethel Hoffman, who works in Aberdeen, was charged with carrying a concealed weapon and assaulting two soldiers with it, but she was found not guilty.

James Ingram, Lakeview Negro, was up on a drunk and disorderly charge, and the warrant was amended to charge his wife, Rocille Ingram, with assaulting her husband. Each

was given 15 days in jail, to be suspended upon payment of the costs. Rocille paid a part of her fine and she was allowed to go home to care for her child.

James Clegg, Carthage Negro, who as a result of a row that took place at Carthage restaurant was charged with assaulting Edward Lee Melver and Adam McLeod with rocks and Garland Morrison with a knife, was given eight months on the roads in each of the cases, the sentences to run concurrently.

Howard Steele, Carthage Negro, plead guilty of the larceny of \$19 from the premises of Annie Jane Kelly and was given four months on the roads.

Floyd Currie of Pinehurst was given six months for public drunkenness and disorderly conduct. He gave notice of appeal and bond was fixed at \$500.

Henry Goins, Southern Pines Negro charged with drawing a gun on a minor child of Anne Robinson and threatening to blow his brains out, was found not guilty.

Donald White, a soldier, drew three months on the roads for being drunk and disorderly on the premises of Hazel Allen.

Found guilty of selling liquor, LeRoy Wooten, Pinehurst Negro, was sentenced to serve three months on the roads. He plead guilty of assaulting Prince High with a gun public drunkenness and disorderly conduct, and was given four months for this, to begin at the expiration of the three months sentence.

#### Other Cases

Wilson Black, Carthage Negro, 30 days suspended upon payment of the costs for driving on the wrong side of the highway; Jim Kimball, Vass, 60 days for public drunkenness and cursing, suspended upon payment of costs and condition that he refrain from drinking intoxicants for two years; Eugene Snipes, Negro soldier, costs and 30-day suspended sentence
