School Improvements Progressing in County

Site Selected for Eagle Springs Building; West End Addition Progressing

Work is progressing nicely on an addition of three class rooms to the West End school building, which will be used for the primary grades.

A site for the proposed Eagle Springs school building has been secured and work is expected to begin around the first of January, County Superintendent H. Lee Thomas disclosed.

The 10-acre tract is north of Highway 211 and one-fourth mile east of Eagle Springs. Mr. Thomas describes it as being one of the prettiest locations he knows of, with good drainage.

The building will be of brick construction, with eight rooms and an auditorium with seating capacity of approximately 500.

Work in the schools throughout the county seems to be running smoothly, and there is an increase of enrollment over last year in all except the Carthage and High Falls schools, Mr. Thomas stated.
