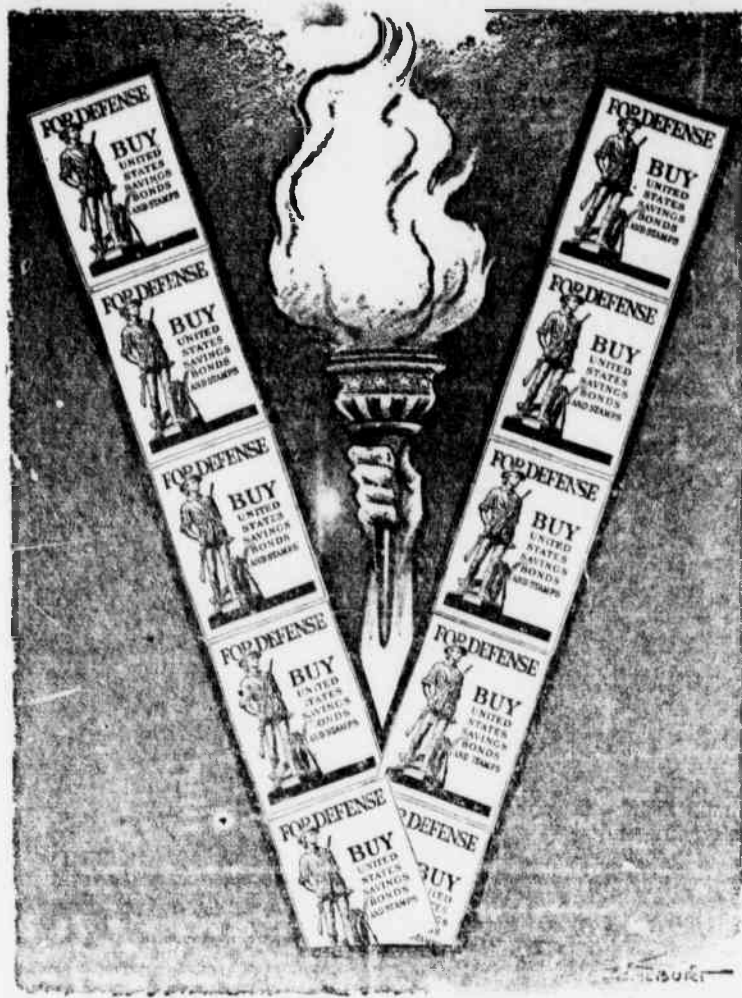

Three Youths Get Eight Months, Suspended, in Theft of Tires

Court Shows Little Leniency in First Case of Tire Stealing in County

Clarence Boyette, 19, Desmond Boyette, 17, and Eugene Smith, 17, of Vass pleaded guilty in Recorder's Court Monday of the larceny of an automobile tire and wheel from the automobile of John T. McKeithen, which was parked on the Stutts-Taylor filling station premises at Vass.

They were given eight months on the roads, each, but the sentence was suspended upon payment of the costs upon condition that the youthful defendants be of good behavior for three years, during which time they are to be under the supervision of the probation officer.

Judge Vance Rowe took into consideration the fact that the car from which the wheel was taken was apparently abandoned, the small value of the tire and tube, the youth of the defendants and the fact that they had not been in trouble before and that the wheel had been recovered.

Stomach Leads to Jail
That the way to a man's heart is through his stomach may be true but in the case of William Henry Kelly the "way" of his stomach led to the roads. Kelly, a Negro of Southern Pines, was given eight months on the roads for forcibly trespassing on the premises of Virgin Cole and taking one mudding of meat, one shoulder, one ham, two pounds of sugar and a quantity of fat pine wood.

In another case he was found guilty of receiving stolen goods, canned fruit and eggs which had been taken from the premises of Rosa Smith, and was given four months to begin at the expiration of the former sentence. Willie Ransom, a second defendant in this case, was not taken.

Matthews McIntosh, 17-year-old Pinehurst Negro, was given 12 months on the roads for stealing a shot gun, a camera and a flash light from the automobile of G. B. Hoke, a guest at a Pinehurst hotel. McIntosh had formerly served a term in a reformatory.

Young Negroes in Trouble

Lillian Minter, 17-year-old Negro girl of Aberdeen, was given nine months in jail for stabbing Dorothy McKinnon with an ice pick, but because of her youth and its being her first offense the sentence was suspended and she was placed on probation for three years upon payment of costs.

Dorothy McClendon, 15, was charged with assaulting Lillian with an ice pick and with biting her. Her case was transferred to Juvenile Court, and she was let out on probation under the care of her uncle, her parents being dead.

Clarence Murchison, 18, a Negro of Sanford Route 3, paid the costs in a bastardy charge and was ordered to pay \$3 per week for the support of his illegitimate child. He drew a six months suspended road sentence.

Ray Leonard Talley of Sanford paid a fine of \$12.50 and costs for speeding with an oil truck. A 60-day road sentence was suspended.

Jess Williams, of Pinehurst, charged with assault and battery, had prayer for judgment continued upon good behavior and upon condition that he and Tom Frye cooperate in an effort to preserve peace and friendly relations between their children. The defendant was charged with slapping Warren Frye, who, according to the testimony, was frequently molesting the Williams boy.

William Wood, Aberdeen Negro, plead guilty of drunken driving. He was given a 60-day road sentence, suspended upon payment of a fine of \$50 and costs.

Robert Harris, Southern Pines Negro, found guilty of simple assault and being drunk and disorderly, drew 30 days, suspended upon payment of costs.

Conducted under standards of the American Red Cross, the Nurses Aid course provides certificates to those who successfully complete the work. Mrs. James Boyd is chairman of the local committee, composed of Mrs. Malcolm D. Kemp and Dr. Mary Cushing of Pinehurst, Miss Lovering, and Miss Ellen Bruton of the hospital staff.

PAPER COMMENTS ON LOCAL LETTER

Charlotte Observer Carries Editorial About Prophetic Letter, Run in Pilot

Recently, The Pilot reprinted a letter written by Stanley Tobin of Southern Pines, son of Mrs. Margaret Tobin, which he had written over two years ago. The Charlotte Observer, in which the letter was originally printed, also saw fit to comment upon the letter. The following editorial recently appeared in the Charlotte paper, captioned "Prophetic of Today":

"Stanley Tobin of Southern Pines, former Observer carrier, wrote a letter for publication in this newspaper in 1939, when he was a youth of 19, that was remarkably prophetic of America's needs today.

"Chiding another youthful writer for his contention that America was likely to have too many warplanes, young Tobin said that, 'had we been properly prepared in the World War, it would not have lasted so long and fewer Americans would have been slaughtered. With mad paper hangers and greedy rulers running loose in the Old World, a wall of armed might in the United States is the only way to scare them out of the Americas.'

"Prophetic of America's present needs, were these assertions in young Tobin's letter of more than two years ago: 'We need a half million trained aviators in the reserves, 50,000 pilots in the standing army, 10,000 pilots in the navy and 10,000 in the Marines and National Guard.'

"Wise words for a youth of 19 to be writing two years ago! What a tragedy that enough men of twice and three times his age were not wise enough to see his eye to eye with the Southern Pines youngster, who was urging two years ago the preparedness the Nation so desperately needs today!

Many a youth in this country has more sense and more patriotism than he is given credit for having.
