## Mrs. Hughes Praises Burt's New Volume

Reviewer at Junior Civic Club Describes Characters in "Along These Streets"

A large audience left the Civic Club Monday night determined to read or to re-read "Along These Streets," latest book by Struthers Burt, local writer, which had just been reviewed by Mrs. E. V. Hughes, for the Junior Civic Club.

With great clarity, Mrs. Hughes portrayed the book's leading characters, seeming almost to present them in life before her audience.

She described Felix Macalister as a "bewildered young man but very intellectually alert"—this being the Felix of the early part of the story. The romance of Felix' mother and father she called one of "Mr. Burt's most daring love stories."

"Mr. Burt's greatest skill lay in his ability to make us hate, suffer, live and think with the characters," Mrs. Hughes said. "The book is an artistic whole with a design, a purpose, that is nearly perfect."

Speaking of the patriotic theme in the novel, Mrs. Hughes said there are "many startling chapters but we can afford to be awakened; for many of us are like those Philadelphians and up to a few months ago thought there was not a threat to our country except 'labor troubles and that man in the White House.'"

The reviewer's style and presentation was as remarkable as she made the book. She seemed at will to be able to quote Mr. Burt's own words and did, at times. His description of the Macalister house, she said, was "like handling old, handwrought silver in which the silversmith had poured his heart and his soul."

After quoting in full Felix' prayer for his country, Mrs. Hughes declared that "a man who can write as well as that about his country should be read. We should encourage people to read him."

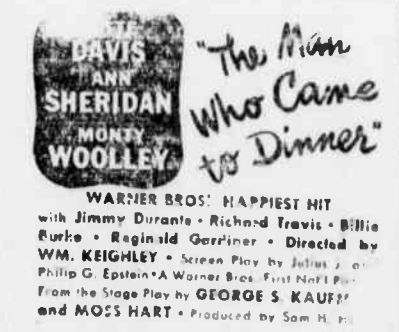
