County Tuberculosis Association Meeting

Dr. Drake Reports Acquisition of Fluoroscope for Use in County Health Work

The recent acquisition from the State Health department of a fluoroscope and sound projecting moving picture machine for use in tuberculosis and other health work was reported to the countywide meeting of the Moore County Tuberculosis Association, held at the home of Mrs. T. A. Cheatham last Tuesday.

The association also gave consideration to locating a place to house tuberculosis patients who are waiting to be admitted to the Sanatorium and those who have been discharged because they are incurable. Such patients, it was pointed out, must be cared for to prevent infecting others. Usual reports were heard, telling of the efforts in various communities to handle tuberculosis cases.

The treasurer's report showed a balance on hand of \$1,761.20, with receipts this year totaling \$3,437.96. Expenditures were made for Sanatorium charges, milk, medicine and supplies, transportation, cod liver oil, medical care, bonus checks to schools for special health work, and of affiliation payment to the State association.

TO HOLD SCHOOLS FOR BUS DRIVERS

Five Training Classes to be Conducted in County During First Week of April

With every school principal in the county an interested listener, Dr. Walter Cutter of the safety division of the State Highway Commission outlined plans for safety schools for school bus drivers at a meeting held last Friday afternoon in the office of County Superintendent H. Lee Thomas in Carthage.

The purpose of these schools is to teach the driver to outwit the hazards of the road, and the course will consist of classroom instruction followed by demonstrations and tests, the pupils being required to operate a bus under usual road conditions.

Five schools will be held during one week in April, the exact dates to be announced later, and boys and girls from 15 years of age up, whether in or out of school, will be eligible for enrollment if they are interested in becoming bus drivers, and those already driving buses are requested to attend.

Four schools for white drivers will be held, as follows: At Hemp for High Falls, Westmore and Hemp; at West End, for Pinchurst, Eagle Springs and West End; at Southern Pines, for Aberdeen, Vass and Southern Pines; at Carthage, for Cameron, Farm Life and Carthage.

One school will be held at Carthage for all Negro school bus drivers of the county.
