'Major,' McArthur in Recorder Court

But Crimes Do Not Jibe with Names; Drunkenness and Assault Cases Dominate

There was somewhat of a military air about Recorder's Court Monday when the names "McArthur" and "Major" Marshall rang through the court room, but the deeds recorded were not suggestive of world heroes.

McArthur Little of Ador, who was up on a capias for failure to comply with a former judgment of the court, was released upon payment of costs, it being found that he had met all of the requirements imposed in a health law violation except furnishing certificates of this to the health office.

Major Marshall, Southern Pines Negro, was given three months on the roads for carrying a concealed weapon, sentence to begin April 15 if he has not by that time paid a fine of \$75, costs to be paid immediately.

Edward Sherard, Southern Pines Negro, was given six months on the roads for assaulting Hallie Mae Sherard with his fist and a walking stick.

Fred McLamb, for escaping from the prison camp, was given this sentence to begin at the expiration of the one he is now serving.

Warren Latham received a similar sentence for escaping.

Elzie King, Pinehurst Negro, for assaulting Clara King, is to serve four months at the county home. For stealing Clara's clothes he was given another sentence of four months, to run concurrently with the former.

Jim Kimball of Vass drew 30 days for public drunkenness, the sentence to run concurrently with a 60-day sentence imposed in October and suspended upon condition that he refrain from drinking any intoxicating liquor for two years.

Lonnie Jones, New York Negro, was given six months on the roads for assaulting Flora Jones.

Sam Johnson, alias "Dirty Red" Johnson, Carthage Negro, was given three months for assaulting Willie Harris with a bottle and for engaging in disorderly conduct.

Lessie Roy and Walter Thomas, Aberdeen Negroes, in an affray case were given 30 days each, to be suspended upon payment of the costs, one-half each.
