Board Says Too Few Apply For Permits to Buy Cars

McGRAW EXPLAINS RULES

Purchase of new automobiles isn't as restricted as most people have been led to believe.

J. L. McGraw, chairman of the Moore County Rationing Board, returning Tuesday from an Atlanta, Ga., conference concerning rationing, said that the "interpretation of rationing rules is so liberal that new cards can now be purchased by anyone engaged in essential work necessary to the successful prosecution of the war."

According to Mr. McGraw, purchase of new 1942 models will be allowed to:

Employes of mills engaged in defense work and those engaged in the lumber business where output goes for army construction.

All necessary public officials, including policemen, firemen, highway employes, mail carriers, licen_ sed fitneys, taxis, engineers and technicians.

Farmers, without trucks, to haul produce and feed to and from their farms.

"The intent of rationing regulations is to see that there is an orderly release of all automobiles now in the hands of dealers," Mr. Mc-Graw said. 
