Blossom time is upon us early this year. Forsythia, jonquils and jessa. mine are a mass of yellow, while the rosy pink of the judas trees glisten amid the browns of the still dormant oaks.

The flowers of the true long leaf pine have already changed from a light rose to the more familiar deep rose purple and the yellow polien fills the air. Not in many years have tres in Southern Pines bloomed so profusely, or been the subject of so many inquiries. Normally trees will blessom about every four years and excessively about every seven years. Popular belief credits the blossoms to the male tree and as a matter of fact the male blossom is prominent in short dense clusters, while the female in groups of two to four is not so conspicuous. 
