Kiwanis Club Vocational Guidance Day Held for Moore County School Seniors

Representatives of Various Occupations Discuss Vocations with School Pupils

High School seniors of Moore County learned something about a number of life's occupations at the fifth annual Vocational Guidance Day sponsored by the Sandhills Kiwanis Club at Southern Pines High School last Friday.

Over 200 seniors and visitors participated in the program which was under the direction of J. W. Harbison, superintendent of Pinehurst schools and chairman of the Kiwanis Vocational Guidance committee. After a morning's program of discussions, the students and visitors were served cakes and ice cream, by students of Southern Pines school.

Prize winners in the essay contest, sponsored by the club, on the subject "My Best Way of Serving Today and Tomorrow" were announced as follows:

First prize to Miss Evelyn Ann Snow of Cameron for her essay on "Nursing;" second to Miss Betty Dunlop of Pinehurst on "Secretarial Work;" and third to Lloyd Woolley of Southern Pines for his essay on "Music." Honorable mention was awarded Miss Catherine Prizer of Southern Pines for her essay on "Nursing."

Given special recognition as the best essay submitted from schools not represented in the grand prize contests were the essays by Russell Batchelor of Aberdeen on "Medicine," by Gladys Garner of High Falls on "Bookkeeping," by Rosa Lee Harring of Vass-Lakeview on "Secretarial Work," and by Dorothy Seago of West End on "Teaching."

Judges of the 20 essays submitted by seven of the county high schools were Almet Jenks, author, Carl G. Thompson, Jr., THE PILOT editor, of Southern Pines, and Shelby Cullom, executive vice-president, Pinehurst Bank.

Marion S. Justice of Raleigh, State Supervisor of occupational information and guidance, addressed the gathered seniors after they had been welcomed by Miss Dorothy Phillips, president of the Southern Pines student body, and Eugene C. Stevens for the Kiwanis Club.

FILLING STATION MAN IS HELD FOR MURDER

Oren Gordon, operator of a filling station near Doub's Chapel in Moore County, was bound to Superior Court under bond of \$1,000 for the murder of Tom Marsh, Negro, at a hearing held before Hugh Kelly, Justice of the Peace, in Carthage Monday.

Gordon is said to have killed Marsh with a shotgun Sunday evening, then went to Carthage, gave himself up and remained in jail until the hearing Monday.

Several witnesses were called, but conflicting versions of the tragedy were given. There was evidence of drinking on both sides, an officer reported.
