### Commissioners to Sit as Board of Equalization and Review Beginning June 8

The Moore County Board of Commissioners will sit as a Board of Equalization and Review for the purpose of reviewing tax values and hearing complaints as to revaluations on June 8, 9 and 10, it was decided at the monthly Board meeting held Monday with all members present.

On June 8, citizens from Mineral townships will be heard; on the 9th, those from Sheffield, Ritter, Deep River and Carthage; on the 10th, those from Sandhills and McNeills.


