McDonald, who served the warrant for arrest early this week, said few details of the shooting were available, but that Mrs. Williams was reported doing well at Moore County Hospital where she was taken for treatment. No motive for the shooting has been advanced. Short, being held for shooting the woman, said to be his niece, and inflicting serious injuries, is a native of this section, but for many years has been connected with a Chicago concern, working here and in other parts of the country.
