

Mrs. I. F. Chandler, Here Over 40 Years, Laid to Final Rest

Was One of Earliest Comers to Sandhills; Became Florist by Hobby

The death this week of Mrs. I. F. Chandler, one of the earliest settlers in town, brought sorrow to all of Southern Pines and the Sandhills community which Mrs. Chandler had done much to brighten and to build.

She died early Tuesday morning at Moore County Hospital where she had been taken the afternoon before seriously ill. The cause of her death was given as pneumonia. She was 67 years old on April 22.

Large numbers of friends attended the funeral services conducted Wednesday afternoon at 5 o'clock at the Baptist Church, with the Rev. J. Fred Stimson officiating. Interment was in Mt. Hope Cemetery, Banks of beautiful flowers filled the church, sent by friends and fellow flower growers not only in the Sandhills but from other parts of the State

Mrs. Chandler came to Southern Pines with her husband early in 1894 and with him, saw the upbuilding of this section as well as contributing much to its advancement. The couple would have celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary on September 30

During her nearly half-century of residence in the Sandhills, Mrs. Chandler centered her interest in her flower garden and floral displays, a hobby which developed into a large florist business, with its owner always in immediate charge of the beautiful flowers which she developed.
