Murder Knife Found Buried in Garden of Man's Home in Sanford

Pvt. Willie McNeill, 23, Camp Mackall soldier whose home is in Sanford, has confessed the brutal murder of Oscar D. Michael, popular Southern Pines taxi operator, and is now in State's Prison, Raleigh, awaiting trial in Moore County Superior Court, according to information given out by local officers, who worked tirelessly on the case until it was broken.

Michael was horribly stabbed early Tuesday morning of last week and thrown from his car in a dying condition in West Southern Pines. He died en route to the Moore County Hos-

Officers immediately called into use every facility for speedily tracking down the guilty party. The trail was localized when Michael's car was found some six hours after its aban-donment at the rear of the Lee County Training School in Sanford by State Highway Patrolman James Coleman, who had a complete description wired by Chief Newton-Numerous fingerprints were found on the car by Agent Zimmerman of the State Bureau of Investigation, who had been summoned from Raleigh.
