## Miss Marie Murphy Wed in Formal Ceremony Saturday Afternoon

In a late afternoon ceremony of beauty and distinction on Saturday, February 26, in the First Baptist Church of Southern Pines, Miss Marie Murphy became the bride of Duncan Googan Malloy, Jr., of Lumber Bridge.

A double ring ceremony was used with Rev. J. Fred Stimson, pastor of the church, taking the bride's responses and Rev. Malcolm Calhoun of St. Pauls hearing the responses of the groom. The vows were spoken in a beautiful setting of tall pine boughs, southern smilax and ivy, which made a background for lighted tapers and large baskets of white gladioli.

Before the ceremony Miss Dorothy Phillips of Chapel Hill gave a program of organ music. Miss Frances Storey of Rockingham sang Schubert's "Ave Maria," "I Love Thee" by Grieg, and "Because" by D'Hardelot. Tiny Crissy Leonard of Welcome sang "The Sweetest Story Ever Told". The traditional wedding marches were used.
