

James Schwartz has been commissioned as local observer in the storm warning service of the United States Weather Bureau for the purpose of keeping the Laurinburg-Maxton Air Base informed as to storms originating in or near Southern Pines.

When a destructive storm is observed the local observer will be expected to telephone the base immediately giving a concise picture of the storm; type, whether thunderstorm, hail, heavy wind or tornado; exact location, time observed, intensity, speed and direction of move-

This service is for the purpose of giving prompt warning to any air. It has already proved its value.
