WITH CONFIDENCE

The first Thanksgiving was celebrated by the Pilgrims in gratitude for the first harvest in the new land. They had gone through a time of great trial. Crossing a stormy sea to reach their destination, they had carried on a precarious existence, that first year, with the sea at their backs and, before them, the dark and fearsome forest. Bravely they had built their cabins, ploughed their land and planted their crops, wondering, we imagine, how many of them would be alive to reap the harvest. And, when that picking time came, bringing a harvest more bountiful than many of them had ever seen, they gave special thanks to the Providence which had watched over them.

The future was uncertain, filled with desperate problems, with unknown dangers, yet, looking at their harvested crops, they saw there a solid accomplishment, testimony to the courage, hardihood, will-power, and intelligence of the planters. And they must have found in the sight a good omen for the future. People who had been able to wrest such a harvest under such conditions had the stuff in them to face the future with confidence.

The country has come through another of its mighty trials. There is no need for us to contemplate our harvest yield, in order to give thanks. We know well for what our thanks are due. It has been granted our country to escape the destruction that has stricken most other lands and for every young man who walks at liberty along our streets a prayer of gratitude goes up. Some of us, many, perhaps, and certainly every one of our returning soldiers, are aware also of that far greater danger which we have escaped by such a narrow margin. We know now, without a shadow of doubt, what would have happened to the world if the German hordes against us and the Japanese against the Philippines had spread their conquering hands. For we give most humble thanks to the American people who are so thankful as they are for their victory, but who are not so complacent as to think that something is done and that something is done that is something to be grateful for. For it is a complacency that has led to the great wave of isolationism that swept the nation, into that isolationist selfish materialism that has kept us from doing our share in the winning of the peace and, by such, made that peace impossible.

One does not hear today the sort of talk that went the rounds back in 1919 and 20, when we were told that one doughboy could lick ten Germans and that any American was better than any Englishman, Frenchman, Italian and so forth all round the globe. Today we know without a shadow of a doubt that one German buzz-bomb kills hundreds of people, be they Americans or whatnot; and even though our country did not suffer bombardment and destruction we cannot any longer fool ourselves that it was because of any cleverness or strength of ours. Britain and Russia saved us from being bombed.

There is little hokum in people's minds, despite the radio. As we listened to those Navy Day programs, with all their oratory and thrilling bands, even while our hearts responded to the cheers, it is safe to say that not one in ten in the crowds or by their radios, giving thanks for our great Navy and our sailors, failed to qualify that thanks with the thought: may they never have to fight again.

We can be truly grateful for the clearer heads, the steadier emotions that we seem to have found, enabling us to look facts more squarely in the face. We are taking the measure of what we have done and of what we are going to have to do. The people of this country are more wide-awake than ever before, less likely to be fooled by politicians, terrified by faked-up dangers, stampeded by brass-hats. That is all something to be grateful for. Like the Pilgrims we have been

severely tested and we have come through very well. The future is full of uncertainty, requiring of us qualities of self-sacrifice and patience harder to display, perhaps, than the fortitude and courage that brought us through the war. Yet, surely we may look ahead with confidence that the basic strength of character we have shown will not fail us in the years that lie ahead.
