Search For Mental Case Discloses Suicide

A search of two days for Edward R. Willcox, 54, an attorney of Norfolk, Va., who was a patient at the Pinebluff Sanatarium, ended Sunday with the finding of his body a short way south of the Sanitarium, it was reported by the sheriff's office

Willcox, who had been undergoing treatment for a nervous disorder, disappeared Friday. He went for a walk shortly before noon and failed to return. It was not until a note was found in his room Sunday, telling where his body would be found, that searchers were successful. Mc-Donald stated that Willcox had taken his own life by cutting his throat with a razor blade.

Coroner Hugh P. Kelly rendered a verdict of death by suicide. This is the second suicide to

take place in two weeks involving the local sanitarium patients, many of whom suffer from violent nervous maladies; the previous case being that of a woman patient who hanged herself in a bathroom.




