

## **Bill Is Passed** For Referendum **On Liquor Stores** 15 Per Cent Of **Qualified Voters May Petition**

"A bill to be entitled an act to submit to the qualified voters of Moore county, the question of continuing the operation of the liquor control stores at Southern Pines and Pinehurst in said county" was introduced by Senator W. H. Currie, and ratified in the closing days of the General As-

The bill provides for the hold-ing of such election on petition presented to the county board of elections signed by at least 15 per cent of the registered voters of Macro county and to be hold Moore county, and to be held within 90 days after the board has determined the petition to be sufficient.

Ballots are to be marked 'Against Southern Pines and Pinehurst Alcoholic Control Stores' and For Southern Pines and Pinehurst Alcoholic Control Stores,' with two voting squares. If a majority of the qualified registered voters of Moore county vote against the stores, they are to be closed within six months, and proper disposal made of their contents, with proceeds properly accounted for and turned over to




