Southern Pines Couple Wed Easter Sunday

The marriage of Eleanor Harloe Moore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Winfred H. Mumford, Southern Pines, to James Herbert Caldwell, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Caldwell of Hallison, N. C., was an event of Easter Sunday, April 6. The vows were spoken at twelve-thirty noon in the Church of Wide Fellowship with the Rev. Tucker G. Humphries, pastor of the church, officiating.

The altar was banked with pine boughs and galax, with Easter lily plants. White tapers in seven branched candelabra were lighted before the ceremony by the ushers. For wedding music Mrs. L. D.
