I hrough the microscope, a March of Dimes-supported research scientist examines a section of tissue (shown enlarged in insert indicated by arrow) which has been attacked by polio virus. The nerve cell, show-ing the peculiar kind of damage inflicted by the virus, came from an animal experimentally infected with material believed to contain polio virus. Since the virus itself is too small to be seen under the micro-scope, scientists are forced to use this roundabout method of proving its presence. March of Dimes funds are alding in the search for simpler and more direct detection work.




