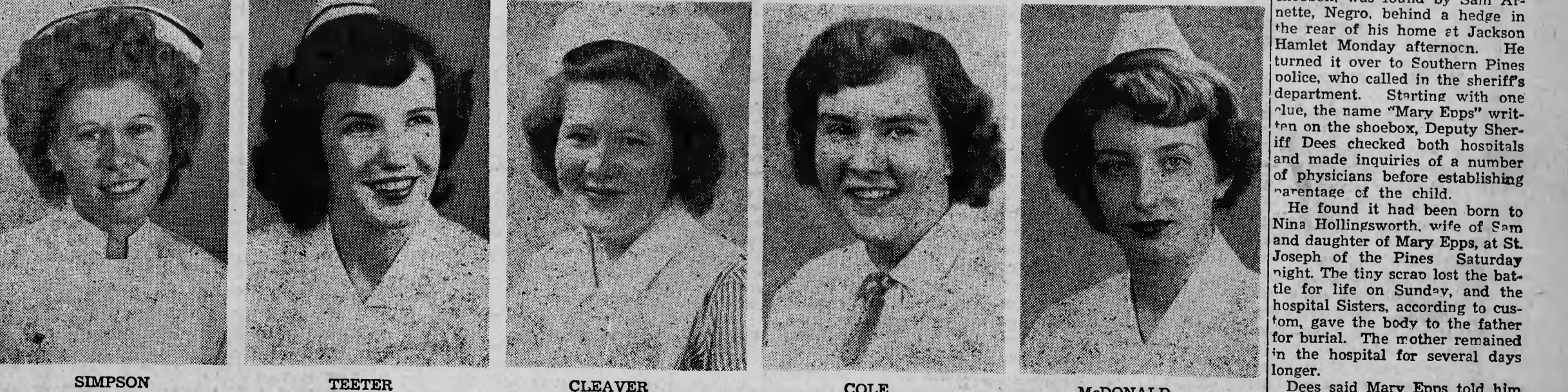
Sandhills Artists' Work On Display
