

Local Men Apply For Radio Permit At Aiken, S. C.

Rapid Growth Seen For S. C. Resort Near H-Bomb Plant

Application to build a 1,000-watt radio station at Aiken, S. C., was filed last Friday with the FCC by Jack S. Younts, of Southern Pines; John Mare, of Southern Pines and New York, and B. T. Whitmire, of Greenville, S. C. Younts is president and Mare vice president of the Sandhills Community Broadcasters, Inc., owners and operators of Station WEEB here. Whitmire is associated with radio stations in Greenville, Charlotte and Greensboro. He is a former president of the South Carolina Broadcasters association.

The Aiken Electronics Advertising corporation, which plans to erect and operate a standard broadcast station at the South Carolina resort, received its charter December 19. Capital stock was listed as \$100,000. Whitmire is president, Younts vice president and Mare is secretary-treasurer. Several directors live in Greenville. Information locally received is that the Commission has been asked for an early grant to build. A transmitter site is to be selected within a mile or two of Aiken. No plans regarding the actual construction date are definite as yet. The station would operate on 990 kilocycles, the same as WEEB, daytime only.

The present population of Aiken is between 7,000 and 8,000. It has no radio station.

The government's new hydrogen bomb plant will be erected in the vicinity of Aiken, partly in the same county. It has been announced that the AEC plans to have some 35,000 workers employed at the peak of the construction work, and once the new atomic plant is open, about 6,000 persons will be employed to man it.

Portraits of Moore Jurists Will Be Presented In Special Court Ceremony

Bar Association Will Honor McIver, Adams And Seawell

Three distinguished jurists of Moore county will be honored at a memorial program to be held by the Moore County Bar association at a date which will be set when arrangements are complete, probably sometime this spring. Portraits of the jurists will be hung in the courtroom at Carthage, to be unveiled with appropriate ceremony, according to tentative plans revealed this week by J. Talbot Johnson of Aberdeen, president of the Moore Bar association.

Honored will be the late Judges James D. McIver, W. J. Adams and H. F. Seawell, of Carthage, arrangements for the presentation of whose portraits are being made by members of their families.

The project was inspired by the fact that lawyers of this county in their travels about the state see in many courtrooms the portraits of native sons who have distinguished themselves on the bench, said President Johnson. They observed that the Carthage courtroom was bare of these, though the county's history does not lack for worthy subjects. Decision to secure such portraits if possible, and unveil them with due honor, was made at a special meeting of the Bar association held a week or two ago. The families when approached were found to be cooperative with the idea.

Tentative plans call for an evening ceremony, a special "court session" to be held at a time convenient to 13th District Resident Judge Don F. Phillips, of Rockingham, when the portraits have been completed. Judge Phillips and court attaches will open the "session" with the usual legal forms. The memorial ceremony will follow.

Selected for the presentation speeches are U. L. Spence, dean of the Moore County Bar, who will honor his former law partner Judge McIver; M. G. Boyette, close friend and protege of Judge Seawell, and County Solicitor W. A. Leland McKeithen, who will speak on Judge Adams.

Judge McIver and Judge Adams were superior court judges and Judge Adams became an associate justice of the State Supreme Court. Judge Seawell has served on the bench of the U. S. Court of Tax Appeals in Washington. All accumulated many distinctions in their long and fruitful lives, and have a secure place in the history of jurisprudence in the State.

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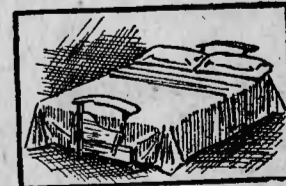


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Sofa-bed and lounge chair

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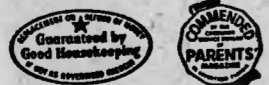
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
