**Youths Will Be Tried In Higher Court
 For Larceny of Racing Stopwatches**

**Timepieces Said
 Taken From Safford
 Barn At Pinehurst**

The theft of three stopwatches used in training fine trotters at the Pinehurst track landed two Negro youths in jail Monday, as Judge J. Vance Rowe of recorders court found probable cause for both, and bound them over to superior court.

Bobby Crawford, Jr., 20, an employee at the track, was charged with larceny of the three watches, moderately valued at \$150, and David Locklee, 18, with aiding and abetting. Bond of \$250 was set for each, which neither was able immediately to make. Pinehurst police testified that Franklin Safford, Pinehurst owner and trainer of about 30 trotters and racers, had reported on Saturday the theft of the watches from a trunk in his barn at the track. They picked up Bobby Crawford, who turned out to have one of the watches, then two other boys were arrested on suspicion. The trail finally led to Locklee, and with the recovery of the other two watches from a burial place in the woods, both admitted their guilt and the circumstances of the theft.

John L. Maultsby, Aberdeen service station operator, charged with breaking windows in automobiles and malicious damage to personal property, did not testify in his own defense but appealed from the recorder's judgment of guilty, with 60-day suspended sentence, fine of \$150 (plus costs) out of which were to come repairs to the windows in cars belonging to James T. Wilkerson and Leonard Calloway. Wilkerson set his damage at \$71.23, Calloway his at \$27.52. Evidence was to the effect that Maultsby had been drinking, and broke the windows of cars parked at his service station in a fit of anger.

Traffic and highway safety law violations predominated on the Monday docket, as follows:

Lacy Gerald Frye, speeding, \$20 and costs; Henry Gerald Myatt, Carthage, speeding 75 mph, 60 days suspended, \$40 and costs; Freddie Young, Rockingham, careless and reckless driving, drunken driving, jury trial set for May 8 under \$300 bond, or \$250 cash bond; Harvey Covington, Southern Pines, drunken driving, careless and reckless driving, jury trial set May 8 under \$200 bond.

Andrew Walton Spivey, Robbins, speeding 75 mph, 60 days suspended, \$40 and costs; William R. Harkey, Albemarle, speeding 55 mph (truck-tractor), \$15 and costs; Andrew Jackson Ingram, Rockingham, speeding 50 mph in 35-mile zone (truck-tractor), prayer for judgment continued on payment of \$30 and costs; Early Coble, Burlington, speeding 65 mph, \$15 and costs; Royce Lamar Moon, Pinehurst, careless and reckless driving, 30 days suspended, \$25 and costs; Wallace Ransom, Pinehurst, careless and reckless driving resulting in accident, three months suspended, \$75 and costs, not to violate speed laws in next 12 months; Robert Hawley Evans, Camp LeJeune, speeding 75 mph, called and failed, cash bond of \$60 forfeited.

James B. Pride, Southern Pines, careless and reckless driving, 60 days suspended, \$35 and costs, not to violate traffic laws in next 12 months; Ollie Franklin Harlow, Richmond, Va., speeding 60 mph, called and failed, \$55 cash bond forfeited; Gerald Frank Belanger, Albany, N. Y., speeding, called and failed, \$60 cash bond forfeited.

Other cases: Augusta Junior King, Addor, unlawful possession and transporting of non-taxpaid whiskey, three months suspended, \$50 and costs, not to violate prohibition laws in next 12 months, car to be delivered to owner; Clarence Freeman on payment of storage bill, it appearing to the court that Freeman knew nothing of the use to which it was to be put when he lent the car to King.

Joseline McLean, Aberdeen, unlawful possession of illicit whiskey for sale, 60 days in jail suspended on payment of \$25 and costs, not to violate prohibition laws for next 12 months; Tom W. Spake, Greensboro, public drunkenness on highway, 30 days suspended on payment of costs; Frank Briggs, Aberdeen, unlawful possession of home brew for sale, prayer for judgment continued on payment of costs and conditions of good behavior for next 12 months; Mamie Briggs, similarly charged, acquitted; Claude Ray, Aberdeen and Southern Pines, assault with deadly weapon, 60 days suspended on payment of costs and half the prosecuting witness' doctor and hospital bills, prosecuting witness to pay the other half. George Rogers, Aberdeen, was acquitted of being publicly drunk on highway.

She was a sister of Dr. Francis L. Owens of Pinehurst, chief of staff of St. Joseph's. Surviving are two other brothers, who are priests, and one sister.

Miss Owens was born at Cresson, daughter of the late John H. and Gertrude L. Owens.
