

### Tennis Finals On Local Courts Saturday, Sunday

Semi-finals and finals in the Third Annual Moore County Closed Tennis tournament will be played Saturday night and Sunday afternoon on the municipal courts, possibly continuing through Sunday evening. Trophies will be given to winners and runners-up by the Sandhills Tennis association, tournament sponsor.

Preliminary matches started Wednesday, scheduled all afternoon and evening for the first three days.

The students wound up their work with a report to the town board, which met in special session. They emphasized that their work is not designed to be used as a plan, but rather to indicate possibilities for planning. "It is up to the town which direction it shall go," they said, "with our findings used only as informational background." The survey, they said, is only physical, designed to be used as an aid in long-range planning for the most advantageous development in years to come.
