#### Light Pole Is **Accident Casualty**; 2 Cars Damaged

Light poles have been casualties in two accidents here latelyone on North May street a couple of weeks ago, another on South May last Saturday night which-caused a three-hour blackout in the immediate area.

In the Saturday accident, though two cars sustained serious damages and the street was festooned with high voltage wires, no one was hurt.

The accident occurred when James Wayne Dupree, 18, of Pinehurst, driving north, somehow lost control of the car, though he was said to have been going at moderate speed. The car swerved from its course and hit a pole across from the old Elks Club, napping it off and sending it crashing down across the street.

Dupree jumped from his car and ran back to warn oncoming traffic, but before he could do so a car coming behind him, driven by Fred W. Seward, of Columbia, S. C., had hit the pole. Seward was driving alone, while Dupree had two other Pinehurst youths as companions. Damage to the Dupree car was estimated by city police at around \$350, to Seward's \$275.

No charges have been preferred, but police said Dupree will be given a hearing before Justice D. E.
