O'Connors In Former Picquet Home; Picquets Move To New Residence

Colonel O'Connor In Germany With 16th Infantry

Another Army family has selected Southern Pines for a permanent home. This is the family of Col. William W. O'Connor, commanding general of the 16th Infantry, now stationed in Germany. Before Colonel O'Connor went overseas last July they purchased the C. W. Picquet home, 410 East Massachusetts avenue, and Mrs. O'Connor and three young O'Connors moved in from Fort Bragg last week.

The Picquets moved last Wednesday to their attractive new home, a modified-modern white frame dwelling in a setting of dogwood and pines, just completed on land formerly a part of the Harry M. Vale estate on Weymouth road.

With Mrs. O'Connor are her daughter, Terrance, 13, and sons, Kevin, 10, and Roderick, six. All are attending school at Notre Dame academy. The eldest son, Mortimer, 21, is a second classman at the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, where his father graduated in 1924.

William O'Connor's first assignment on his graduation as a second lieutenant was, by coincidence, with the same division which he is now commanding. The 16th Infantry was then stationed on Governors Island, N. Y.,

and he was married at that time to Miss Muriel Lenane, of New York City.

The intervening years and his Army career have carried them pretty much over the face of the earth. They were successively stationed at San Antonio, Texas; Hawaii; Fort Benning, Ga.; the Philippines; Fort Adams, Newport, R. I., and Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, where Colonel O'Connor (then lieutenant colonel) attended the General Command and Staff school.

The coming of World War 2 saw him serving at Cheyenne, Wyo., and at military bases in California, Texas and Maryland, to all of which his growing family accompanied him.

When he went overseas to campaign in Europe with Patton's army, however, Mrs. O'Connor and the children settled down in Hendersonville, in the North Carolina mountains, for the duration. On Colonel O'Connor's return they were returned to Fort Benning; were stationed for two years on Guatemala, and lived for a time in Washington, D. C., where he attended the War college. He was then assigned to V Corps at Fort Bragg.

While at Fort Bragg they frequently drove over to Southern Pines and, says Mrs. O'Connor, "fell in love with the place." She decided against following him with the children to Germany, and will await his return in their own home here.

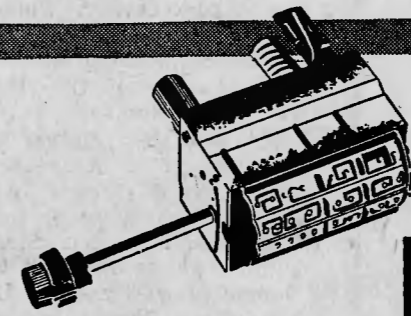

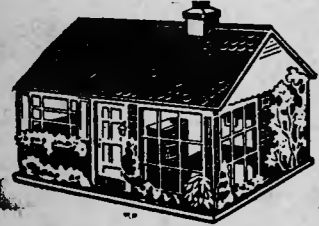

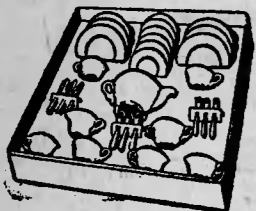
