

Recorders Court Held Last Saturday, Adjourns Till Tuesday of Next Week

Most One Defendant Convicted And Fined: Five Are Acquitted

Moore County recorders court, adjourned Monday, was held Friday of last week and adjourns until next Tuesday. The Saturday session was opened by the opening of the term at Carthage Monday. Tuesday will be court day week instead of Monday, on account of the Armistice Day.

10 cases called Saturday, defendants failed to appear. Capiases were ordered; five acquitted, and one, found guilty, appealed to superior court. Other dealt with family and vital payments, which were ordered by the court. Just one defendant was found guilty and

ined. This was Edwin Odell Brooks, of West End, who paid \$25 and costs on a careless and reckless driving charge.

Capiases were ordered for Adam Watson, West End, for failure to comply, and Willie Williams, Aberdeen, charged with driving while drunk.

Pleading not guilty, and found not guilty, were Thonell McLaughlin, Wagram, carrying concealed weapon, assault with deadly weapon; George T. Robinson, Wagram, affray; Arthur Thomas, Robbins, and Jim Wyatt and Hubert Stockwell, Camp Mackall, all charged with driving while drunk.

Judgment was continued for Ernest Brewer, of Robbins, RFD, found guilty of abandonment and failure to provide for his wife and child, on payment of costs, \$10 weekly till further order and a \$34 doctor bill incurred by his wife for herself and baby. Brewer gave notice of appeal and bond was set at \$500.

Payments on a hospital bill were reduced for Alexander Locklear, Pinehurst, so he could afford to continue \$10 weekly payments fixed by the court for his wife and child. However, the court ordered that the hospital and medical bill should be paid up by January 10.

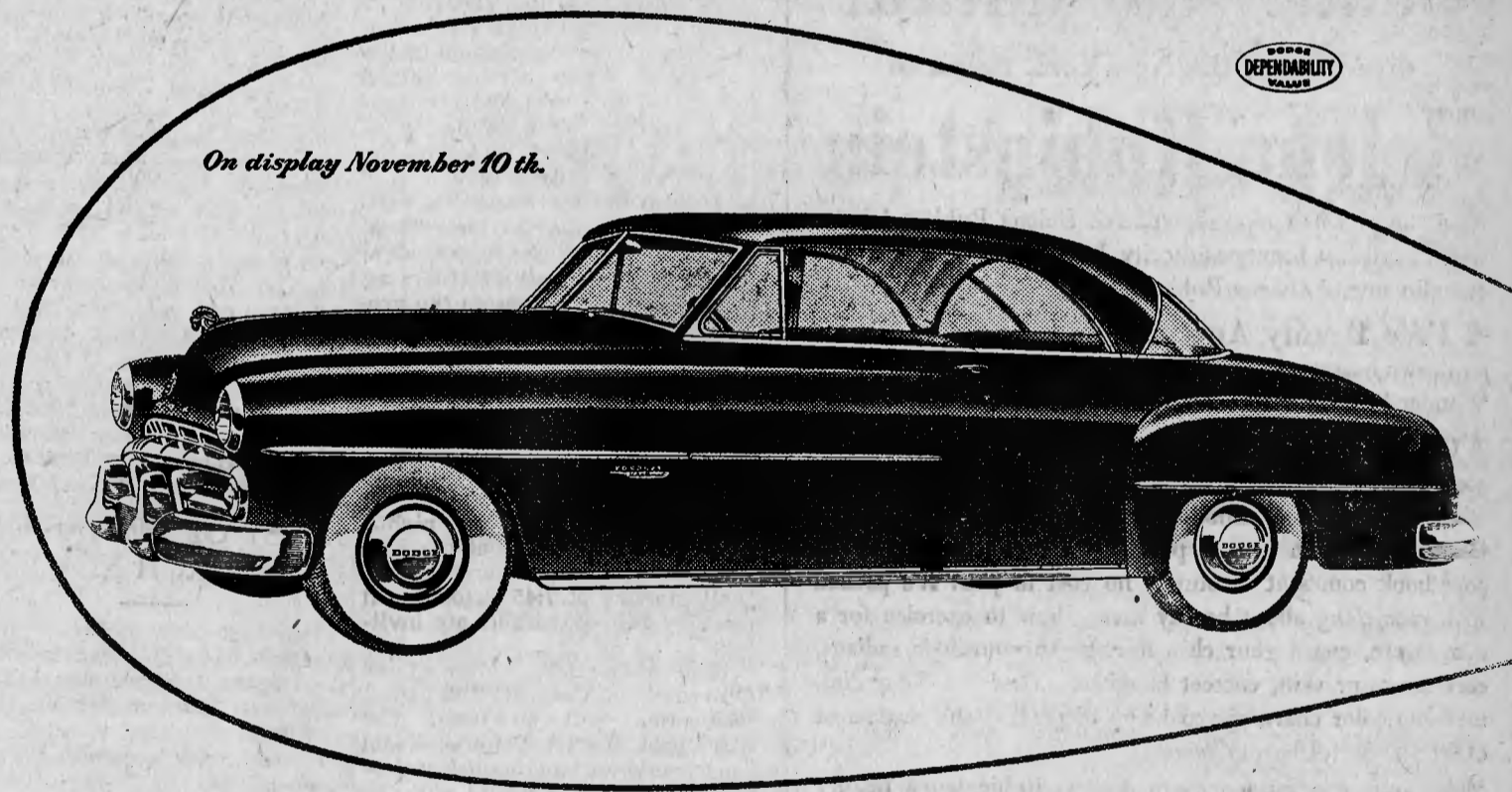
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
