January Bond Sales In Moore Total \$40,325

Sales of Series E, F and G savings bonds in Moore county for January totaled \$40,325, of which \$38,625 was in Series E bonds; none in F bonds and \$1,700 in Series G bonds, according to a report by County Savings Bonds Chairman E. C. Stevens of Southern Pines, based on the monthly sales report from Allison James, State Director of U. S. Savings Bonds in Greensboro.

Total figures for North Carolina's 100 counties were as follows: Series E Bonds \$4,187, 648; Series F \$92,389; Series G \$520,700; totaling \$4,800,737.

The county chairman said that Series E Bond sales for January exceeded January sales of last year by \$57,305 in North Carolina. The E Bond continues to be a popular investment, he said.

During a nationwide school savings drive from November 15 through January 31, North Carolina almost doubled its assigned quota of 75 new school savings program installations. The latest count shows that 145 additional North Carolina schools have tied in with the defense effort and are teaching thrift and saving, and students are permitted to actually practice thrift and saving through the purchase of U. S. Defense Stamps at the schools. This brings the total installations in North Carolina to 497.

Demonstrations to test the life of treated and untreated fence posts have been set up at the county fair grounds in Craven and Beaufort counties. They are the first such demonstrations to be started in North Carolina.
