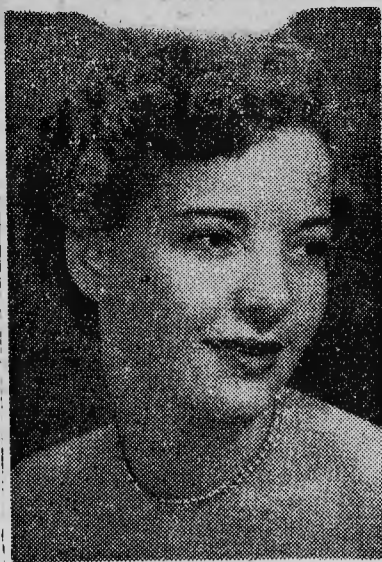
This fashion show will take place the evening before the biggest feminine golf tournament of the season, the North and South Golden Anniversary Championship for women, which will begin Tuesday.
