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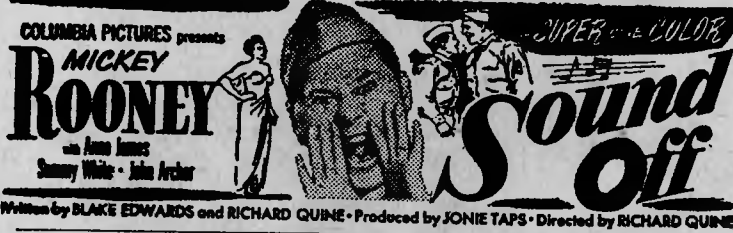

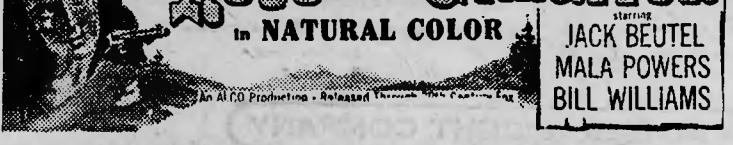

It is photographed in the new Anso color developed with Metro, and the hues are a decided advantage in displaying the primitive locations in Northwest Canada, and making the most of the snow-blanketed scenery. The acting of Stewart Granger and Wendell Corey is outstanding.

After an absence of almost 20 years, Helen Hayes, described as the first lady of the American theatre, is back on the screen and delivering a performance which, by a minimum estimate, rates her a nomination in the 1952 Academy Award sweepstakes. She will be seen in "My Son John," coming to the Carolina theatre Sunday through Wednesday, June 15-18, at 8:15 p. m. with matinees Sunday and Tuesday at 3.

Senator Mundt of South Dakota, a key figure in the Congressional investigations of the Alger Hiss case, was one of a group of legislators who saw "My Son John" at the Motion Picture Association's Academia theatre in Washington. He took the Senate floor to praise the film for "faithfully and feelingly depicting the evil poisons of godless communism." He described the film at various times as "undoubtedly the greatest, most stirring, pro-American picture of the past decade," "magnificent entertainment, and a dramatic production of hearty patriotic motive," and "a picture which has stirred America more than any film since 'Birth of a Nation.'"

"My Son John" is a great drama of human emotions in conflict, which probes searchingly into the human heart and loyalty to country. It is superbly acted by Helen Hayes and a splendid cast including Robert Walker, Van Heflin, Dean Jagger, Minor Watson and many others.

No more searching probe into the dire effects of Soviet teachings on American young men who fall under the influence of Communist doctrines, and the disruption this can bring into family relations, has been filmed than in this great drama.

Camp Durant, the Occaneechee Council Camp for Boy Scouts and Explorer Scouts, will open Monday and remain in operation until August 8. Scout Units have been sending in reservations for some time now and the first three weekly periods are full and overflowing, according to information from Council headquarters at Raleigh this week.

The lure of hiking, swimming, cooking out, making gadgets and handcraft, competing in Scouting skills, archery, marksmanship and many other adventures is speeding up preparation by Boy Scouts. There is a health certificate necessary, camp clothes must be packed, patrol and troop meetings are being held to plan every detail of the camp, and many other items must be taken care of.

Besides Camp Durant, the Council will conduct Camp Whispering Pines for Negro Scouts. The camp is located at Reedy Creek park, a fully equipped camp on State property. This camp will be run in two periods—July 13-19, and August 10-16. Explorer Scouts of the Council will have an especially busy summer with some high adventures planned. Some of these are: A week at Meadows of Dan in the mountains of Western Virginia; a 20-day trip to Philmont, national scout camp on top of the Continental Divide in the New Mexico Rockies; canoe trips down nearby rivers; the annual Explorer Scout Rendezvous, at the Jacksonville, (Fla.) Naval Air Base, and others.

Coroner's Jury Rules Davis' Death Caused By Blow

A coroner's jury, sitting last Thursday night at the Southern Pines firehouse, rendered its verdict that William Davis, 81, Negro, came to his death "by being struck by a blunt instrument, or instruments, by a party or parties unknown, or a person or persons unknown."

Davis, a resident of Manly, was found dead Saturday morning, May 30, beside the Seaboard main line midway between Southern Pines and Manly. He was injured across the back, his skull was crushed in back and the heel was partly torn from his left shoe. Some of his belongings, including a small amount of change, were found scattered near by.

Mrs. Goldsmith Passes Suddenly At Nursing Home

Mrs. Mabel Pettes Goldsmith died Thursday following a cerebral hemorrhage.

Mrs. Goldsmith died at the Anchorage Nursing Home, whither she had been taken a week previously, when, on May 29, she suffered the first attack. She was making good progress with hopes held out for recovery when the second seizure occurred.

The funeral service took place at the Brownson Memorial Presbyterian church, Sunday afternoon, at four o'clock. The Rev. Cheves K. Ligon, pastor of the church, officiated, assisted by the Rev. C. I. Calcote, of Broadway. Mr. Calcote had been a former pastor of the deceased when he served the church at Manly and is an old family friend.

Burial was at Mount Hope cemetery. Pallbearers were: Lennox Forsyth, Howard Butler, Thomas H. Wilson, Bill Blue, Raymond and Robert Cameron.

Mrs. Goldsmith is survived by her two sons, John Moore and Proctor, her mother, Mrs. John Pettes, and two grandchildren, John Jr., and Lynn.

Mrs. Goldsmith was an only child, the daughter of John and Elizabeth Moore Pettes of Chrysoptome, Quebec, where Mrs. Goldsmith was born in 1897. The family came from Canada to Southern Pines in 1906, living on North Bennett street. In 1915 Mabel married Harry Goldsmith and the young couple settled in the fine farm on the old Yadkin Road, now the so-called Connecticut avenue extension. The land was fertile and, with her husband, Mrs. Goldsmith entered into the farm-life. The Goldsmith farm was noted for its fine asparagus, raspberries, strawberries, and all manner of flowering shrubs and fruit trees.

During recent years, Mrs. Goldsmith took up nursing for which she had always shown much aptitude, doing regular practical nurse duty at Moore County hospital, Miss Chase's Convalescent Home and The Anchorage, under Mrs. Perham. In her capacity as a nurse she was untiring in her efforts, earning a warm place in the hearts of her patients and the respect of the community for her generous and faithful service.

Attending their sister-in-law's funeral, Sunday, were Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Goldsmith, of Beckley, West Virginia, and W. W. Goldsmith, of Charleston, West Virginia. Mr. and Mrs. Proctor Goldsmith and their little girl, Lynn, flew in from Norman, Oklahoma, where he is in training at the Naval Air Technical Training School.
