

It's Canning Time At Prison Camp

The canning season is now in full swing at the Moore county prison camp with more than 50,000 cans of various vegetables having already been packed. All the canning is done at the prison where modern facilities are available.

Superintendent Moffitt Jackson said that a large quantity of garden peas, kraut, squash, beans, field peas, tomatoes and peach preserves have already been can-

ned.

Yet to be canned are lima beans, turnip greens, sweet potatoes and apples. The canning of apples won't get underway until around the 15th of September.

Twenty-four thousand cans of peaches have already been packed. The peach preserves are served at the guard tables and used in the lunches for the prisoners.

All the vegetables and fruits are put up in No. 10 cans.

Last year, Mr. Jackson said, between 65,000 and 75,000 cans of vegetables and fruits were put up. No apples were canned last year because a large supply was left over from the previous year.

R. Flake Shaw Heads Committee

Farm Bureau Executive Vice-President R. Flake Shaw announced in Greensboro Tuesday that he has accepted the chairmanship of the National Cotton Council's Mechanization Steering committee.

He will assume this new position in addition to his present office as executive head of the North Carolina Farm Bureau.

Mr. Shaw said, "The major purpose of the Mechanization Steering committee is to stimulate interest in an effort toward optimum efficiency in Cotton Belt Agriculture through mechanization and related technology."

He pointed out that his committee would work with (1) cotton producers and others in the cotton industry, (2) research and educational people, (3) farm equipment manufacturers and distributors, (4) chemical manufacturers, and (5) other related interests who can make a contribution to sound development of mechanization.
