Mrs. Cole completed her graduate training this summer in the Graduate School of Social Work, Chapel Hill.

Dr. W.C. Hilderman Joins Staff of Charlotte Clinic

The addition of Dr. W. C. Hilderman to the staff of the Nalle Clinic in Charlotte was announced last week. Dr. Hilderman is associated with Dr. Edward R. Hipp in the department of general surgery.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Hilderman of 225 Weymouth road, Southern Pines, Dr. Hilderman attended the public schools of Danville, Va., and received his A. B. degree from the University of North Carolina in 1938. He began his medical education there, and continued his studies at Jefferson Medical college, Philadelphia, receiving his M. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a SPECIAL ELECTION will be held in the Town of Southern Pines, North Carolina, on the 18th day of November, 1952, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said Town, the following four propositions:

The polls for said election will open at the hour of 6:30 o'clock, A. M., and will close at the hour of 6:30 o'clock, P. M., Eastern Standard Time. The polling place for said election shall be the usual polling place in the Town of Southern Pines, to-wit: Southern Pines Fire House.

The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Southern Pines has appointed Mrs. Grace Kaylor to act as Registrar, and Lawrence E. Grover and Frank E. Walker to act as Judges of Election for said election.

The Registrar will be furnished with the registration book used at the last regular election held in the Town of Southern Pines (being the regular municipal election held on May 8th, 1951) and he will revise the registration book so that it will show an accurate list of the electors previously registered in the Town and still residing therein, without requiring such electors to register anew. The Registrar will keep the registration book open for the registration of new electors on each day (Sundays and holidays excepted) for the period beginning Friday, the 24th day of October, 1952, and

ending on Friday, the 31st day of October, 1952. The book will be kept open on each Saturday during such period from 9 o'clock A. M. until 9 o'clock P. M., and on other days during such period from 9 o'clock A. M. until 5 o'clock P. M.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Southern Pines as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Southern Pines has ascertained and hereby determines that it is necessary that said Town reconstruct the existing building used by the Town as a storage barn so as to provide a building for the storage of the Town's fire truck, and to erect a new building to provide a place for the storage of town trucks and to acquire the furnishings and equipment constituting a part of such buildings, and that it will be necessary to expend for said purpose not less than \$34,000.

Section 2. Said Board of Commissioners has also ascertained and hereby determines that the purpose hereinbefore described is a necessary expense of said Town within the meaning of Section 7 of Article VII of the Constitution of North Carolina, and is a purpose for which said Town may raise or appropriate money, and is not a current expense of said Town.

Section 3. In order to raise the money required for such purpose, bonds of the Town of Southern Pines are hereby authorized and shall be issued pursuant to The Municipal Finance Act, 1921, of North Carolina. Six Steps To GI Loan Are Outlined

Six steps to a GI loan for a home, farm, or business were outlined by the Veterans Administration for the benefit of more than a million veterans who have been discharged from the armed services since the start of the Korean conflict.

The new Korean GI Bill, signed into law by the President on July 16, 1952, amends the loan guaranty section of the World War II GI Bill to include eligible veterans with service anywhere in the world since June 27, 1950.

Veterans Administration regional offices across the country are now issuing certificates of loan eligibility and processing applications for loan guaranty.

The six major steps to a GI loan are: 1—Find the property or business venture you want to buy; 2—Go to a bank, building and loan association, or other institution; 3—Present your plan and your original discharge or separation papers; 4—Property is appraised by VA-approved appraisers; 5—Certificate of reasonable value goes to the lender; 6—If application is approved, the loan is made.

In step No. 3, the original discharge or separation paper is needed to apply for a certificate of eligibility. Veterans Administration said that veterans need not rush to apply for these certificates since there is usually time to do so when the loan application is submitted.

Local Veterans Administration regional offices, however, will issue certificates of eligibility at any time upon the request of an eligible veteran.

To be eligible, veterans must have been discharged or released under conditions other than dishonorable; they must have had active military or naval service in the U. S. forces anywhere in the world at any time after June 27, 1950 and before the current emergency is declared ended, and they must have served at least 90 days unless they were discharged sooner for a service-connected disability.
