

Hardy Succeeds Caddell, County PMA Chairman For More Than A Decade

James M. Hardy of Cameron, Rt. 1, was elected chairman of the Moore County Production and Marketing Administration (PMA) committee at Carthage Friday, December 19, when delegates from the nine township communities met to elect county PMA officers for the coming year.

Mr. Hardy succeeds Joe A. Caddell of Carthage, who has been chairman of the Moore PMA committee for over 10 years, and a member of the county committee since the PMA program went into effect almost 15 years ago.

The position of vice-chairman also changed hands at last week's election, as C. W. Holder of Carthage, Star route, replaced Sam Dilling of Jackson Springs. Re-elected as regular member of the committee was W. Lee Patterson of Jackson Springs.

Walter I. Fields, secretary, and Mrs. Pauline Anthony, both of Carthage, full-time workers in the PMA office on the third floor of the courthouse, were re-elected.

The county committee is elected by nine men—one delegate from each of the county's nine townships. These delegates, as well as

three-man community committees in each township, were elected in countywide voting held Thursday, December 18.

Community Committees

In each community, three committeemen and two alternates were elected, the three committeemen being the candidates with the highest number of votes, and the alternates those who received the next two highest counts.

The committeemen assist farmers in their communities with all phases of the program of the Production and Marketing Administration, including the PMA's Agriculture Conservation Program and its payments or material assistance to farmers who institute approved practices on their land.

Reservists May Be Assigned For Training At Pope

Interested Air Force personnel can now submit applications for mobilization assignments with Headquarters Ninth Air Force, Major General E. J. Timberlake, commanding general, has announced.

The mobilization assignee program is designed to give reservists an opportunity to keep abreast with the Air Force by participating in a training program which is scheduled at the reservist's convenience. The reservist is assigned to a position, and is earmarked for that particular duty, in the event of mobilization.

During training, the assignee performs duty with active military personnel, and is required to wear the uniform.

Twenty-four training periods per year are authorized, with pay, and credits toward ultimate promotion in the reserve and toward reserve retirement are granted.

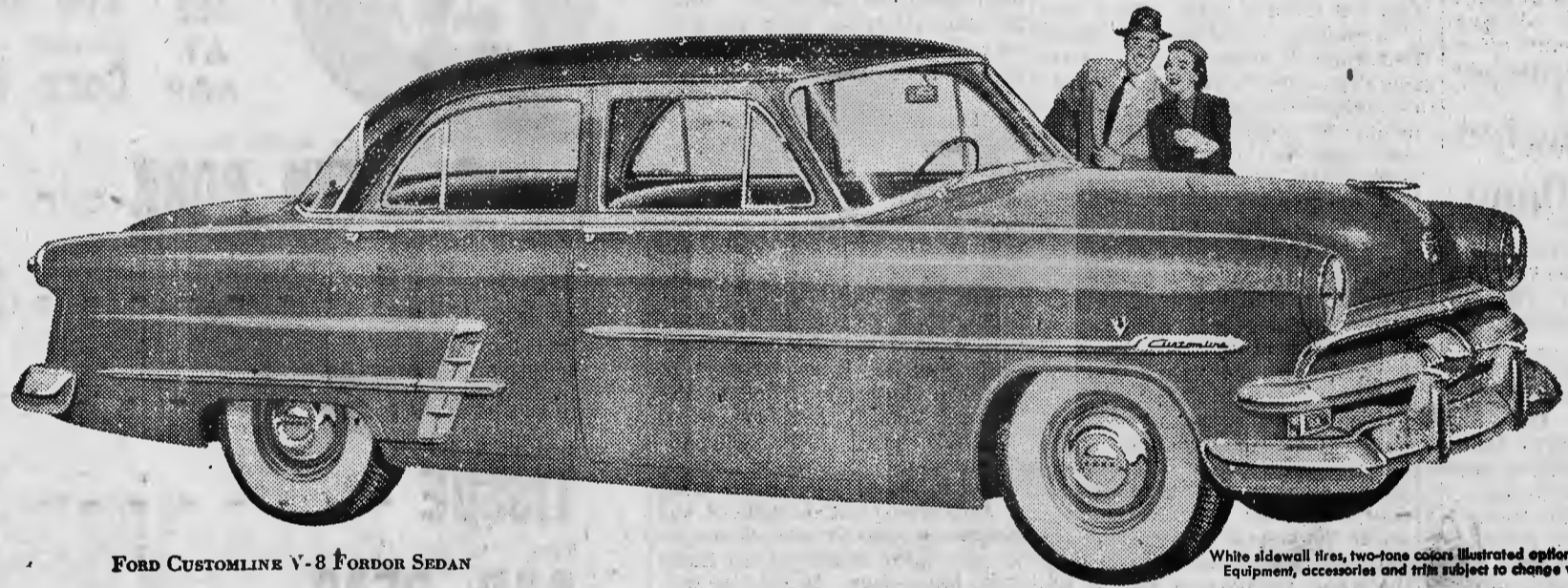

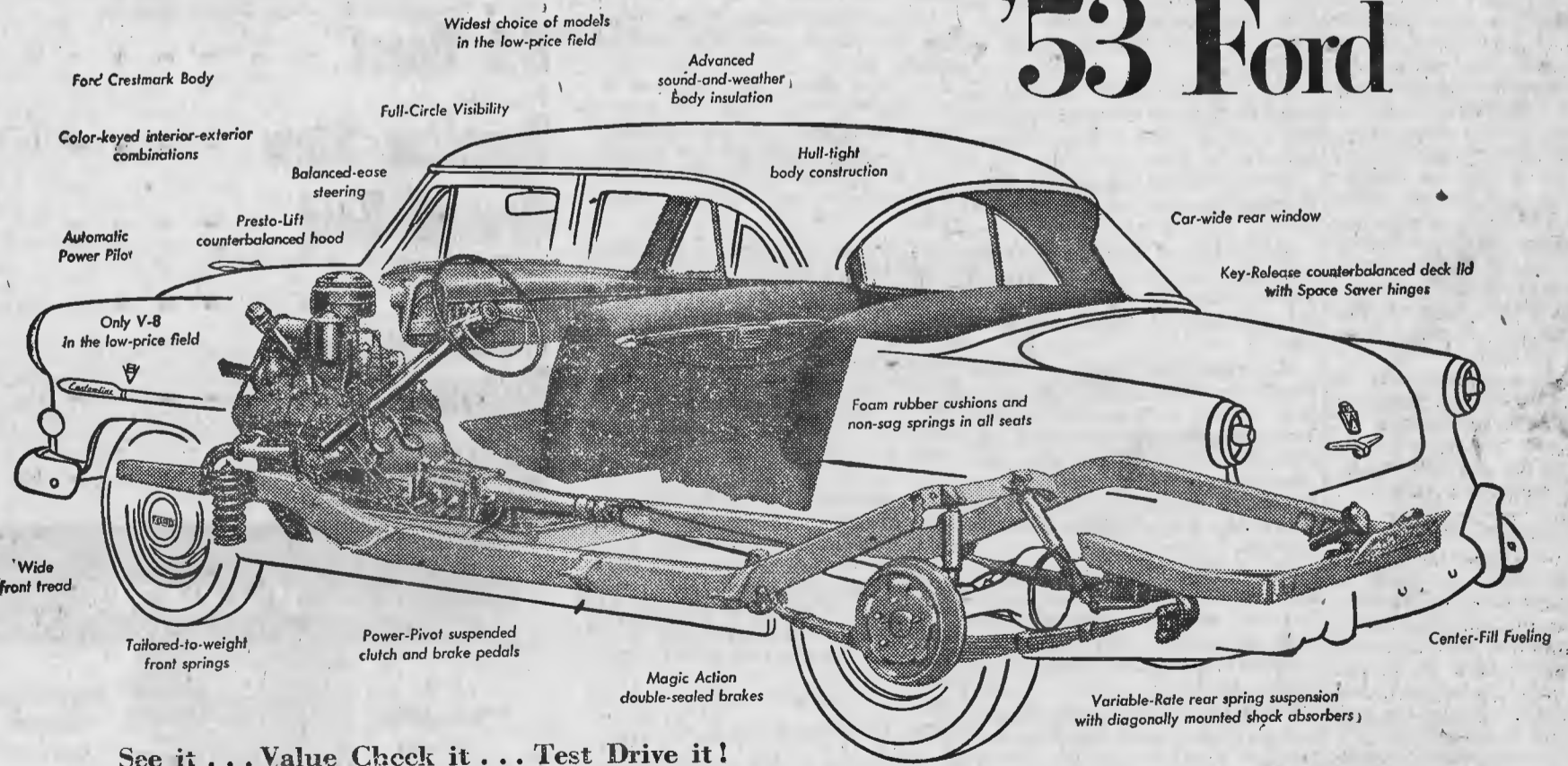
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
