Until such time as the bicycle rider knows and understands his or her responsibility in riding a bicycle on a public road, the rider should ride in a protected area, away from danger, until such responsibility and understanding is

Bicycles should be parked in racks on the school grounds, unless other arrangements for parking them has been made by school


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
