\$750,000 Listed As **Tentative Cost of** Highway 1 Project

The proposed rerouting of US Highway 1 through Southern Pines is now all set as a part of the State Highway Commission's program. Work is proceeding on plans for drainage and structures, looking toward the letting of contracts later this year, said Eighth Division Highway Commissioner Forrest Lockey of Aberdeen this

The protest period, during which a map of the proposed route remained posted on the courthouse wall, passed without incident, he said. "As I recall, there was only one formal protest," Commissioner Lockey said. He discussed the plan with several citizens, and answered their questions, and no further protests were filed. Plans cannot be halted except by protest of the county commissioners or Southern Pines town council.
