

Spray perennial grasses when weeds are small, particularly with chickweed. Do not spray the crop in the seedling stage or just prior to heading.

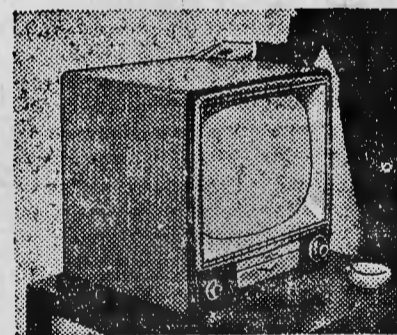

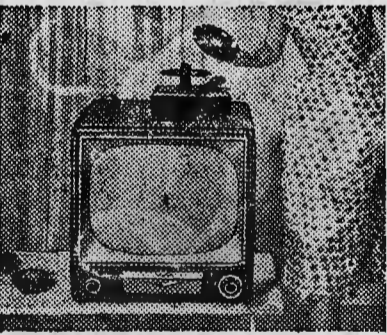

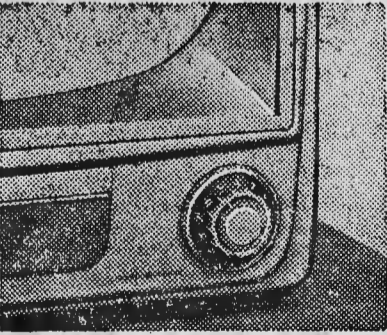
