## **Unusual Will Of Former Resident Reveals Bequest** Mrs. Dwight Hoskins To Receive Half of \$30,000 Estate

Mrs. Algene Edson Hoskins said today she was "overwhelmed" by news that Calvert Wilson, 49, who died recently in a desert disaster in California, had bequeathed her half of his estate, adding also that she found it "rather upsetting" and would prefer not to say anything about it until she knew more details.

A Burbank, Calif., attorney phoned her, with meager information, several days ago following the death of Calvert Wilson, formerly of Southern Pines. He told her details would follow, but they haven't arrived. An Associated Press dispatch today said Mrs. Hoskins had been bequeathed half of his estate valued at some \$30,000, and had been made executrix of his will.
