Young Pastor, 28, Dies Suddenly In Massachusetts

The Rev. Harold Chase Buckminster, 28, pastor of the Dingletown Community church (Congregational) in Greenwich, Conn., died Saturday at the Beverly Hospital following a short illness. A native of Boston, he was summing at Manchester-by-the-Sea, Mass., while preparing to return to his parish in the fall.

He was the son of the late Harold Chase Buckminster, Sr., a Boston investment broker, who died in 1941, and Mrs. James How, now a resident of Pinehurst. Mr. Buckminster first attended Miss May Chapman's Cottage School in Pinehurst. He was a graduate of Aiken Preparatory School, Aiken, S. C., St. Mark's School ('44), Princeton University ('48), and Union Theological Seminary ('52).

Following his theological studies, he worked among the underprivileged children in the Harlem District of New York. He accepted the Greenwich Parish several years ago. St. Mark's has honored him during the last two years, asking him to deliver the Alumni Day sermon to graduates returning to Southboro in 1954 and 1955. At Princeton, he was a member of the Key and Seal Club.

In addition to his mother, he is survived by two brothers, William B. Buckminster of Carmel, Calif. and Edmonde W. Buckminster with the Army at Aberdeen, Md. Services were held Monday at the graveside in the Old Framingham burying ground, Framingham, Mass.
