Court Hears 95 Speeding Case, Other Serious Violations of Traffic Laws

Heavy Fines Imposed: One-Defendant Up For Third Offense

Heavy fines in traffic cases featured a long docket heard by Judge J. Vance Rowe, with Solicitor W. Lamont Brown prosecuting, in Recorder's Court at Carthage Monday.

Most spectacular of the charges was that against Russell Hussey of Robbins who was accused of driving 95 miles per hour and careless and reckless driving causing an accident.

As usual in traffic cases, Judge Rowe upped the penalty in proportion to the severity of the offense, sentencing Hussey to six months on the roads, suspended on payment of a \$250 fine and costs. He was ordered to surrender his driver's license and will not be permitted to operate a motor vehicle for the next two years.

A defendant who apparently could not learn by experience was Jack Wesley Sanders of Star who faced the court on his third offense of driving without operator's license, while revocation of his license was in effect.

The judge cracked down on this defendant also, setting a three-months road sentence which was suspended on payment of \$300 fine and costs and on condition Sanders not operate a motor vehicle during the next two years without a legal and valid operator's license.

Sixty days on the roads, suspended on payment of \$300 fine and costs, was the penalty imposed on Michael John Furey of Fort Bragg who was charged with careless and reckless driving causing an accident.

It was directed that defendant pay repairs to the Garner car and medical expenses, up to the amount of the fine, of persons injured.

Sentence Appealed
Jesse Norman Benton and Richard Willard, both of Aberdeen, Route 1, pleaded not guilty to a charge of larceny.

The warrant for their arrest was amended to charge violation of the law against sharecroppers removing a crop without permission and without giving notice and without having satisfied all liens held by the landlord against the crop.

Richard Willard was found guilty of removing a crop without giving the landlord notice and Benton was found guilty of aiding and abetting Willard.

Each entered appeal to Superior Court and bond for each was set at \$300.

Parks, Southern Pines, speeding 65, \$10 and costs; Robert Elmer Capei, Pinehurst, speeding 65, \$25 to include costs; Donald Alton Richardson, Eagle Springs, speeding 70, \$15 and costs; Charlie Ussery, West End, malicious injury to personal property, 90 days on roads, suspended on payment of \$125 fine and costs and reimbursement of Pinehurst, Inc., for damages done to Pinehurst jail; Elbert Jean Phillips, Troy, speeding 65, pleaded not guilty, found guilty of driving over 55, but not as much as 65, \$20, to include costs; Janie B. Sheffield, Robbins, bedding and cohabiting, 60 days in jail, suspended on payment of \$25 fine and costs, on condition of good behavior for 12 months and on condition she not live with Howard Williams or any other man unless she is married to him (Williams was tried and found guilty of the same offense in recent court session).

James Edward West, Greensboro, non-support of wife and child, found guilty of abandonment and failure to provide support for seven-months-old baby, three months on roads, suspended on payment of the costs and payment of \$60 to his former wife and then payment of \$50 per month, beginning October 1, until further order of the court, the payments to be made to the clerk of court of Moore County; Nathan McNeill, Aberdeen, possession of illicit whiskey for sale, three months on roads, suspended for two years on payment of \$50 fine and costs and on condition he not violate the prohibition laws in the next two years—the sheriff to destroy the one-half gallon of whiskey; William Leslie McMillan, Winston-Salem, speeding 66, driving without lights at night, \$17.50 and costs; Arthur L. Cahill, N. Wellington, Mass., speeding 65, driving without lights, \$15 and costs.

Raymond Harold Skipper, Greensboro, speeding 65, passing on hill, driving on wrong side of highway, \$25 and costs; Clinton Williams, Robbins, Route 1, drunk and disorderly in public place, 30 days on roads, to begin at expiration of sentence in case tried July 26, the judgment in that to be invoked; James McRae, Jackson Hamlet, possession of illicit whiskey, pleaded not guilty, found guilty, judgment continued on payment of the costs, the sheriff to destroy the pint of whiskey; Richard Dean Garrison, Pinehurst, speeding 65, failing to stop at stop sign, no signal before turn, \$20 and costs; James Michael Chiricoes, Southern Pines, speeding 70, \$15 and costs; Fred Garland Wear, High Point, Route 1, speeding 70, no registration card, \$15 and costs; Frederick Harrison Taylor, Pinehurst, speeding 69, \$15 and costs.

James Hutchins Carthage, careless and reckless driving causing accident and property damage, no operator's license, called and failed, capias for defendant, set on bondsman, bond set at \$200; C. S. Caldwell, Durham, case continued to Monday on account of illness; Robert L. Biter, Fort Bragg, careless and reckless driving, accident, drunken driving, pleaded not guilty, case continued to Monday because of absence of state's witness, bond set at \$250, plea changed to guilty, \$100 and costs, driver's license to be revoked for 12 months; Elbert Watson Taylor, Jr., Carthage, careless and reckless driving, pleaded not guilty, found guilty of disorderly conduct, judgment continued on payment of costs; Clifford C. Horton, Addor, driving without operator's license, judgment continued on payment of costs (defendant has applied for license).

Margaret Arnold and Nathaniel McCall, both of Aberdeen, unlawful bedding and cohabiting, 30 days in jail for woman, on roads for man, suspended for each on payment of joint fine of \$50 and costs and on condition they not repeat the offense in the next 12 months. George Marshall McLeod, Southern Pines, failure to yield right of way, judgment continued on payment of costs; John Alford Albert, Southern Pines, speeding
