## 3rd Location For Town Hall Is Considered

Meeting last Friday afternoon for their second session of the week about the site of a new municipal center, members of the town council agreed not to pick the site that day and heard strong arguments for reconsidering as location for the center a tract bounded by New York Ave. and Bennett St.

All action on the site was suspended pending an investigation of what the New York Ave. and Bennett St. property could be bought for. The note on which the meeting closed was Councilman Sam Richardson's statement that it might be better to spend more to get the right site and less on buildings, even if all the facilities. contemplated can't be constructed

Willing To Wait Other members of the council appeared willing to hold up a final decision until all the facts about various sites had been pre-

The council has \$100,000 to spend on the project, as authorized by the people in a recent bond election. With this money they plan to buy a site and construct as much as possible of the following facilities: administrative offices, fire department, police department and jail.

At Tuesday's meeting last reek, the council heard arguments by citizens and discussed the alleged merits and demerits of the two other sites—the park block on which the town hall is now located and a site bounded by Leak St. and Pennsylvania

Ave. Town Manager Tom E. Cunningham repeated Friday the estimate he had made Tuesday that about half the Pennsylvania Ave. block-fronting 200 feet on Pennsylvania and running the entire length of the block along Leak St. to New Hampshire Ave.could be bought at an outside cost
