

### Farm Life Group To Decide On CDP Program For Area

A move to establish a Community Development Program in the Farm Life area was warmly greeted by a representative group from the community at a meeting last Friday night.

J. A. Glazener, program planning specialist of the State College Extension Service and one of the principal figures in the effort to establish community development programs throughout the state, was main speaker. He traced the success of the movement in Western North Carolina, where it has gained widespread acceptance, and urged that it be adopted here.

He used a number of colored slides he had made in Transylvania County, where he was formerly the county agent, to point up the many advantages of the CDP.

The group, which numbered about 25, elected Paul Green to serve as temporary chairman for a similar meeting tomorrow (Friday) night to discuss whether the community would either adopt or reject the program.

The meeting was held as an outgrowth of a previous meeting of the county Agricultural Workers Council, which had decided to offer and recommend the program to one community on a trial basis.

It has the backing of Fleet Allen, county farm agent, and Miss Flora McDonald, home agent.

### Former Pastor Of Church Here Going To Franklin, Va.

The Rev. Tucker G. Humphries, former pastor of the Church of Wide Fellowship here and more recently pastor of the Congregational Christian Church of Reidsville, has resigned to move to accept a new position in Virginia.

### Spencer Love To Head Christmas Seal Sale For '56

Spencer Love of Greensboro has accepted the state chairmanship of the 1956 Christmas Seal Sale, it has been announced by E. N. Pope, president of the North Carolina Tuberculosis Association.

The 50th annual campaign to raise funds for the voluntary fight against TB will get underway November 15.

"Although much progress has been made in the first half century of the Christmas Seal Sale," Mr. Pope said, "we cannot afford to lessen our efforts against a disease which still strikes 100,000 Americans each year."

Mr. Love is chairman of the board for Burlington Industries, Inc., the leading fabricator of textiles in the world, which operates 90 plants in 13 states and four foreign countries and employs 47,000 people.

In making the announcement, Mr. Pope paid tribute to Mr. Love's record of service to the state and nation in industrial, economic, and educational affairs. In 1946 he served as Christmas Seal Chairman for the Greensboro Tuberculosis Association. "We are happy to have a distinguished industrialist and man of demonstrated leadership as our state chairman," he said.

At present Mr. Love is a member of the Business Advisory Council of the U. S. Department of Commerce and trustee of the Committee on Economic Development; a member of the Visiting Committee of N. C. State College and of the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration; and vice-chairman of the Development Council of the Univer-

### State League Of Municipalities Meets In Raleigh

The proposed 1957 legislative program of the North Carolina League of Municipalities was the main topic of discussion as some 15 mayors met in Raleigh Tuesday with Mayor Voit Gilmore of Southern Pines, chairman of the League's legislative committee.

The group discussed problems common to most towns, particularly as they relate to a town-state relationship. Many of the towns represented, it was reported, had problems of annexation of new areas, for which they requested that general policies be explained.

Others were faced with problems having to do with school bus service. Mayor Gilmore said the group also discussed the question of trying to obtain a more equitable distribution of intangible and road taxes for municipalities, and the ever present problem of state maintenance of highways that pass

The League's recommendations will be passed on through various legislators at the next convening of the General Assembly.

Production of all milk in North Carolina, including milk for home use, for the first six months of this year is estimated by dairymen to amount to 862 million pounds. This is an increase of 21 million pounds (or 2.5 per cent) over that produced during the same period in 1955.

An August 1 estimate places the state's watermelon production at 2,600,000 melons for 1956. Marketing specialists with the North Carolina Crop Reporting Service say this production will be 340,000 melons, or 11.6 per cent, under last year's production. Yields averaged about 200 melons per acre.

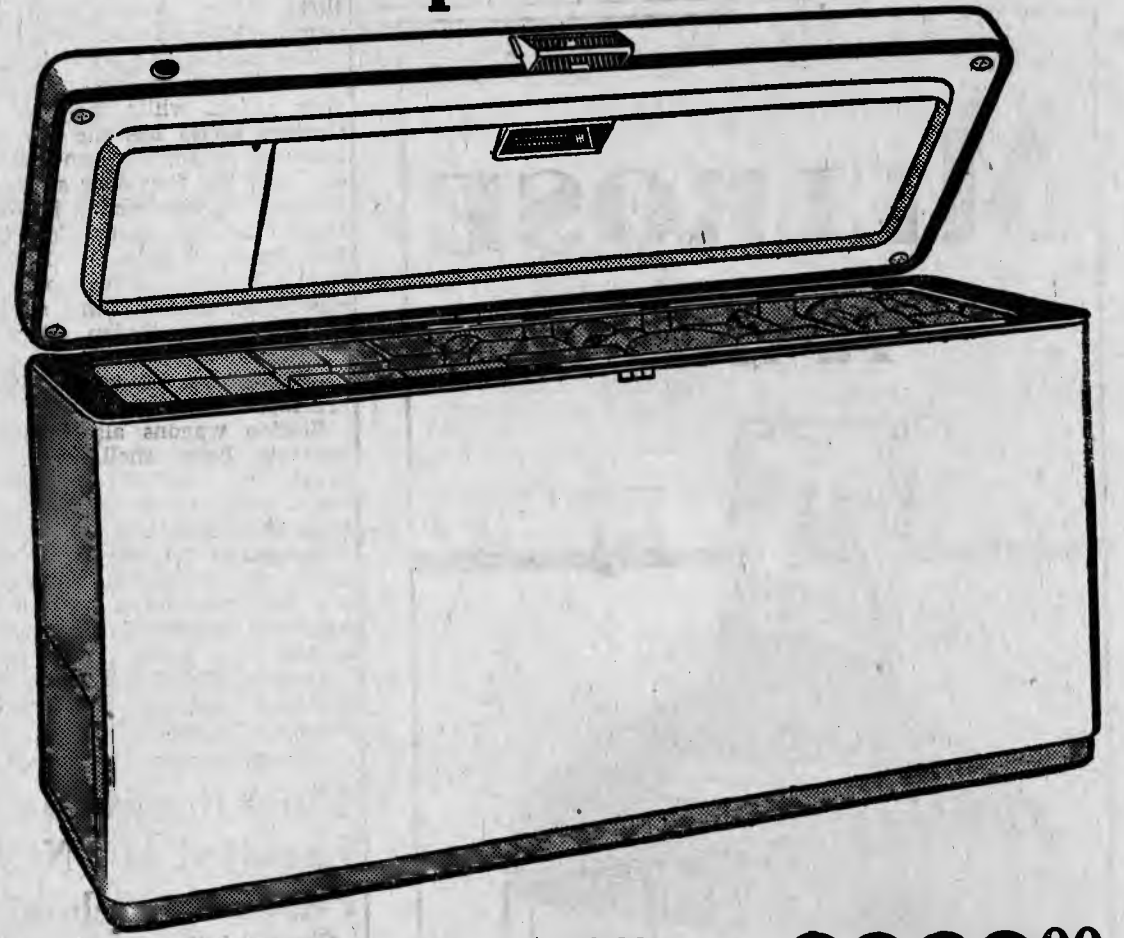

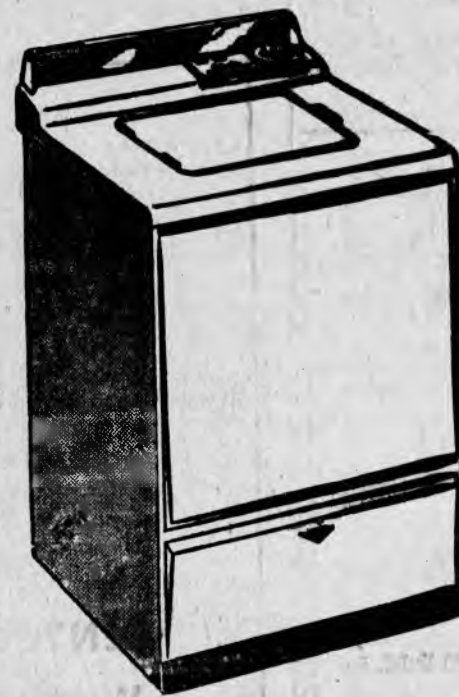
