Negro Knifed, Seriously Injured, In Evening Club Brawl Saturday Night

Norman Raisen, 56, a West Southern Pines Negro, was charged with the knifing of another Negro by the Southern Pines police department following his arrest early Sunday morning. The Negro he is charged with cutting, Charlie Gillis, is in a hospital in fair condition. Chief C. E. Newton said that Raisen, no stranger to brushes with the law, told this story after he was arrested: He, Elijah (Buddy) Huggins, and Gus Campbell, also of West Southern Pines, bought a pint of whiskey Saturday afternoon and made for the woods to find a good quiet place to drink it. While there, he was approached by a person identified as Buddy Funderburk and was asked to help move a car that had become bogged down. When Raisen and Funderburk got to the car Gillis was there and had already succeeded in moving the car. He complained of having a "hurt" back, Raisen said. Later, Raisen related, he went

Club in West Southern Pines and was standing at the door when Gillis came by and started a fight. Raisen said he pulled out his knife, slashed Gillis in the stomach and on the face. He was arrested the next morning by Chief Newton. Police also reported another disturbance Saturday at the Evening Club, which is becoming notorious. They said that Don Gales, 46, who gave his address as Jackson Hamlet, had assaulted his wife there about 9 p. m. Saturday night. Gales, police said, was carrying a Navy flare gun into which he had inserted part of a shotgun shell. The flare gun, which can easily be carried in the pocket, is extremely dangerous, police said. Gales was ordered to appear in Recorder's Court Monday morning, but the case was continued until next Monday. He is presently at liberty under \$400 bond, which had been ordered at a preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace Lloyd T. Clark.

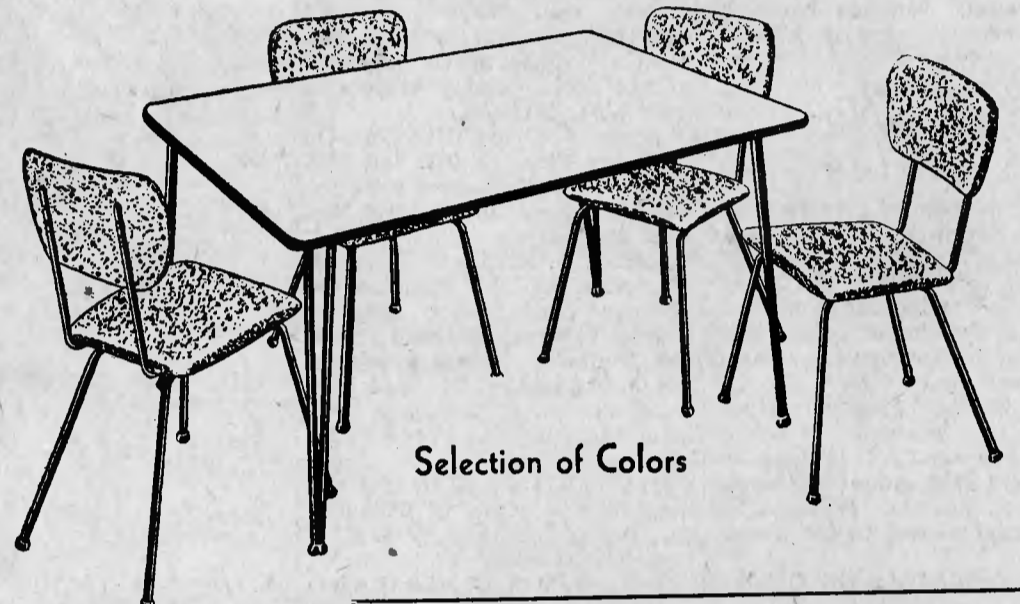
