Mrs. Golden will continue her fine work in church, Sunday School, choir and Women of the Church.

Although the Rev. Mr. Golden has retired from the active pastorate of the church, they will be in their new home on Sunset Drive and their interest in the church will continue.

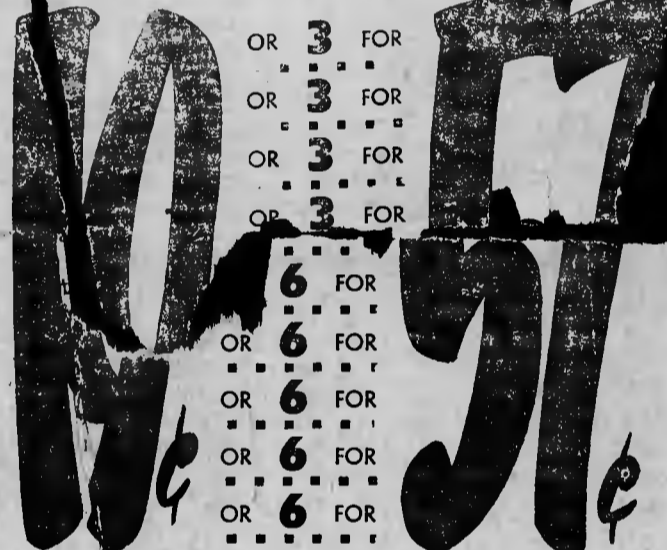
