Bike Riders Get Periodic Warning On Safety Rules

Bicycle riders in Southern Pines are the source of countless complaints from people who say the youngsters are getting to be a real problem on the streets, Police Chief C. E. Newton said this morning.

"Maybe it's because the youngsters, and some grown people, too, do not know the proper rules and regulations that have been laid down for theirs and the automobile driver's safety," Chief Newton said.

He enumerated the principal regulations and suggestions as follows:

Obey all traffic signs and rules; keep to the right and stay close to the curb (many people are still under the misconception that bicycles are supposed to be driven facing traffic, bit of wrong thinking that has led to more than one needless death); do not stop or park on paved portion of highways; come to full stop before entering main streets or highways; give proper hand signals when changing direction or turning; and do not pass to the right when overtaking another vehicle.

The police department suggested, for proper safeguards to "bike" riders, the following:

Be sure brakes are in good working order, have headlights and rear reflector for night riding; do not race; do not ride a bicycle upon any sidewalk or

walkway in town; and do not leave your bike lying around where it may be picked up.

Stunt riders, those who ride without maintaining a firm grip on handlebars, are just fooling themselves, Chief Newton said. He added that this type riding had led to many accidents.

Girl Scout Drive Surpasses Goal

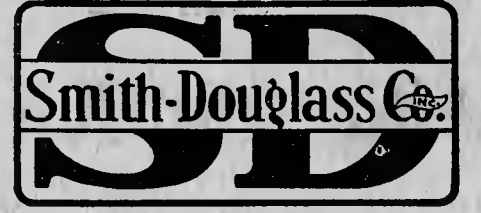
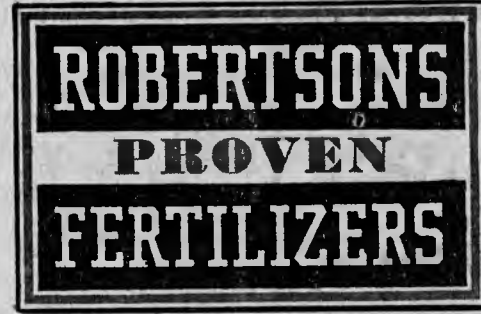
The annual Girl Scout fund drive in Moore County has gone over the goal of \$2,200, it was announced this morning by Robert S. Ewing, fund drive chairman.

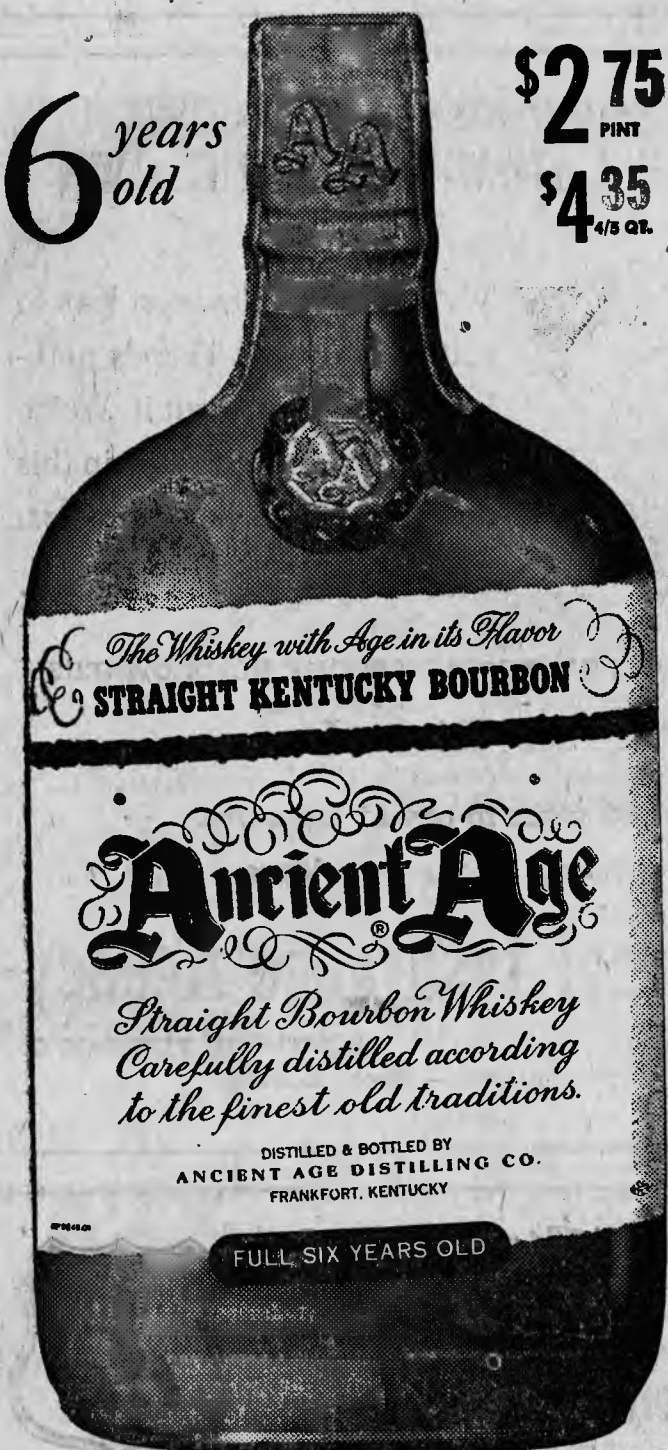
